

Coupons Will Aid Vets at Aspinwall

Drive in Patton Being Conducted Thru Schools

Residents of Northern Cambria Co., and of the whole state as well, can aid disabled veterans of World Wars I and II at the Aspinwall Hospital, Pittsburgh, by merely contributing coupons they run across nearly every day to the American Legion Auxiliary nearest them.

Money derived from the sale of these coupons, gathered throughout the state, together with any cash contributions, will be applied to the construction of a covered grandstand for the benefit of the exservicemen hospitalized there.

At the present time facilities for entertainment for these disabled veterans is limited. Erection of such a structure will enable even some of the stretcher cases to be present.

This coupon project of the American Legion Auxiliary has enabled the group to sponsor and support many similar worthy projects in the past, including the greenhouse at Valley Forge, the master radio set for 500 at the Naval Hospital, the Clubmobile at Anzio Beachhead, and others.

New Ford Trucks To Be Shown Soon

A new line of Ford trucks is to be shown to the public for the first time by Ford Motor Co. dealers on Friday of this week. The streamlined 1948 model is completely new from the wheels up and represents the first post-war product of Ford.

Three new power plants are available—95 h. p. 6-cylinder engine and 100 and 145 h. p. 8-cylinder engines. They are attractively styled with recessed grille and headlights. New heavy-type fenders and driver comfort also will be noted, and bumpers are extra cross-braces for the frame. The cabs are up to seven inches wider and the door has been moved forward. Weather-proofing has been improved and hardware is heavier.

91 Percent of Coal Now Cut by Machines

About 91 percent of all bituminous coal mined in underground operations throughout this country is cut by machines.

Over 58 percent is mechanically loaded and only four percent is mined by pick and shovel, according to a bulletin from the Bituminous Coal Institute.

More and more small mines are mechanizing. Most of the larger mines have been mechanized for years.

Manion Mine No. 3 Lauded by Bureau

The Manion's Coal Corp.'s No. 3 Spangler Mine at Barnesboro has been cited by Federal Inspector Walter D. Brown in a report to the U. S. Bureau of Mines for complete compliance with 20 safety improvements and beginning over a dozen other precautionary measures.

A report on the pit, which employs 44 men and produces 150 tons of coal daily, also lists a number of violations of the federal safety code and proposes corrective measures.

Brown advises more air at the working places, precautions against short-circuiting the ventilating circuit and a ban on underground smoking.

He praised a plan of systematic timbering now in use and lauded the frequent roof tests which are conducted.

Under the listing of miscellaneous recommendations, the inspector pointed to the need for the general use of protective hats, footwear and goggles.

Fricas at Flinton Nets Jail 3 Terms

Three residents of Utahville, Clearfield Co., were sentenced to spend 30 days each in the county jail, on Monday, when they pleaded guilty to charges growing out of a fracas in a restaurant in Flinton. They are Ben McCusker, Howard Peckham and George Snow.

The three men are said to have broken down a door and forced their way into a restaurant owned by John Gaul after they had been ejected from the establishment. Mr. Gaul said the trio then attacked him and his son. The men were ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$35 to repair the damaged door.

The total amount of taxes, municipal claims, penalties, interest and costs due is \$8,731.77.
