Many major mines in the area—hard hit by the car situation—have been forced to purchase coal on outside markets in order to meet orders.

At the same time, thousands of coal miners suffered big cuts in paychecks as operations remained idle from one to two days each week.

In addition to the tight supply of railroad hoppers, many mines have been shouldering another handicap. They have been unable to obtain the number of miners needed to keep production at the peak capacity. Hundreds of miners would be employed at district operations if they were available.

Coal Mining Suffers Production Losses So Far This Year

Rail Car Shortage Big Factor in North County

Hampered by a railroad car shortage, the District coal mines were forced down to a slow pace before the walk-out threw in a full block.

A downward dip in production in January continued during the past month, according to tonnage figures provided by the State Department of Mines.

Coal output in Central Pennsylvania region in February fell almost 1,000,000 below Jan., 1947, when mines were springing off to a peacetime record.

Production dropped approximately 350,000 tons below January, 1948. With deep mines now closed, hopes for another banner year in the mine fields have been dealt an early blow.

A railroad car "famine" during February cut a wide gash from potential production in the area. During February miners in the 11 bituminous districts comprising the area's coal region dug 3,092-

Consolidations Opposed by Twps.

Supervisors and officers in the second class townships in Indiana, Blair, Cambria and Butler counties organized at Indiana on Wednesday night of last week to fight consolidation.

J. Garfield Bagshaw, of Frankstown R. D., was named head of the group.

The organization also asked a check of the funds of the Pennsylvania Association of Township Supervisors, the state body of which all township officers are members.

According to a report at the meeting, \$30,000 is paid as dues into the state organization annually. They seek to have half the amount turned back to the townships.
