

Decedent Estate Changes Urged By State Group

Harrisburg—(PNS)—A legislative committee studying possible changes in the Fiduciaries Act covering the administration of decedent estates has now made a number of recommended changes to the Joint State Government Commission for submission to the 1949 session of the Legislature.

One of the proposals would simplify the settlement of small estates by making it unnecessary in certain cases to follow the more elaborate and costly procedure necessary in the settlement of larger estates.

Another proposal would increase the widow's and children's exemption from \$500 to \$750 in recognition of the higher cost of living; and also simplify and expediate the payment of the exemption to the widow and children.

Provision has been made in the new draft for clarifying the rights of beneficiaries, distributees and creditors in the many cases where no letters testamentary are issued.

Sportsmen Voice Disapproval of New Limit at 'Paradise'

The Cambria Co. Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs at a meeting Wednesday evening of last week at the Courthouse in Ebensburg voiced its disapproval of the cutting of the creel limit to one fish at the Fisherman's Paradise near Bellefonte.

The county group, in a resolution, has asked Fish Commissioner Charles A. French to take action to restore the two-fish limit.

According to the Fish Commission, the 1948 limit at the Paradise was reduced because of the large number of trout taken annually. The Cambria Co. group points out that it is not worth while for anglers from Western Pennsylvania to make the trip to Bellefonte for only one trout.

The representatives of all the local sportsmen's organizations in the county also planned for an increase in the trout game feeding project for next year. The Bedford Co. group has signified its intention of cooperating with the Cambria Co. group next winter in the providing of food for game.
