### G. M. Tacks 8 Pct. On Price of Cars

**Cheapest Chevrolet Will Cost \$80 More**

The giant General Motors Corp. Saturday abandoned its lone stand against the mounting cost of production and announced an eight percent price increase on all its passenger cars.

C. E. Wilson, GM president, ordered the new prices effective Monday of this week on all models of Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, and Buick cars.

The new price boosts brought the Detroit factory list price of the cheapest Chevrolet, a business coupe, to \$1,160, an increase of \$80, the list price of a similar Ford is \$1,163.

General Motors is the last of the major auto manufacturers to raise prices on the heels of the third round of post-war wage increases.

Wilson said GM would not increase truck prices at this time. Most other manufacturers boosted truck prices in conjunction with car price increases.

Ford accompanied its 1949 bid for supremacy in the low-priced field with an 8.7 per cent increase in the price of the new Ford models. The boosts ranged from \$85 to \$125.

Only Crosley Corp.'s prices on its small cars remain unchanged.
