

54 North Cambrians Drawn For Jury Duty in September

Grand Jurors to Meet Day After Labor Day

A total of 54 Northern Cambria residents have been drawn for jury duty during the September term of court at Ebensburg. A total of 294 names were drawn from the jury wheel.

The grand jury of 24 persons, of which three are from this district, will convene on Tuesday, Sept. 7. Ordinarily the grand jurors would have met on Monday, Sept. 6, but the opening session has been set back because of the Labor Day holiday.

One hundred and 40 men and women, including 25 Northern Cambrians, have been drawn for the petit jury which will serve during criminal court week—beginning Monday, Sept. 20. The traverse jury for civil court, set to begin Sept. 27, is comprised of 130 persons, including 23 from this section of the county.

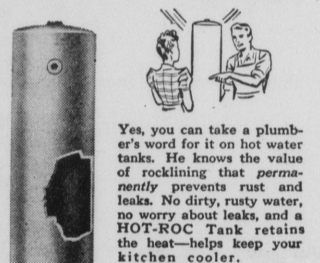

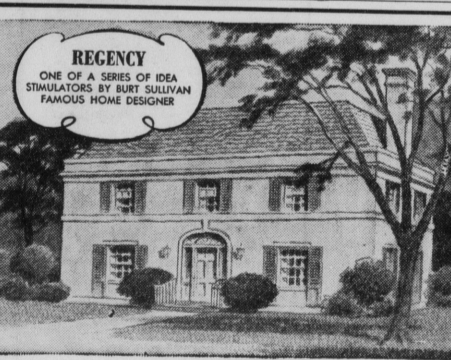

Basement Stairs Black and Blues!

We've heard of the Basin Street Blues. What about the Basement Stairs Black and Blues?

The basement stairway is the most hazardous part of the entire house.

Black and blue bruises, broken limbs, even deaths, have resulted in falls down these stairs.

Being somewhat out of sight, the basement stairs are often in a sad state of repair, unlighted, and cluttered with odds and ends.

The top and bottom steps of the basement stairway should be painted white or there should be a handy light switch to illuminate this dangerous passage.

Broken or loose steps should certainly be repaired at once.

A hand rail is a great help, especially if there are elderly persons in the household who use the basement stairs.

Brooms, mops, rubbers, paint cans—even roller skates—are habitually stored on the stairs.

While we are on the subject of the basement, we might as well recommend cleaning up that neglected pile of rubbish in the corner.

Many fires originate in the basement from spontaneous combustion among old rags, newspapers and such materials.

The wiring around the wash machine should be properly safeguarded, for wet hands on defective electrical equipment can cause catastrophes.
