### Allentown Silk Mill Workers Granted 7c-Per-Hour Raise

About 1,100 silk and rayon textile workers in eight plants in Allentown, Pa., will receive wage increases of seven cents per hour as the result of an arbitration award handed down during the past week by Dr. Robert F. Brecht, arbitrator of the American Arbitration Assn.

This award, which is retroactive to June 1, was made public by the Textile Workers Union of America (CIO) through its executive director, Sol Stetin. Mr. Stetin states that 1,500 additional workers in some 18 textile mills in the Allentown area are expected to receive a similar increase. "This increase," states Stetin, "is the second in a period of six months."

In January of this year, Allentown silk and rayon workers secured a wage increase of from 10 to 15 cents per hour. The arbitration award is the result of a dispute in a wage reopening clause of the agreement currently in effect between the Textile Workers Union of America and the following employers: American Beauty Fabrics Corp., Corlis Mfg. Co., Edna Silks, Hi-Grade Textile Co., Inc., Tuscan Silks Inc., United Textile Co., L. Hyman Co. Inc., and the Marian Mills.

### Barnesboro R. D. Man Meets Death in Auto Accident

John Kolcun, 30, of Barnesboro R. D. was injured fatally at one o'clock on Saturday afternoon when trapped in the flaming wreckage of his automobile along Route 219 near Garmentown, north of Barnesboro. State police and Coroner Joseph Govekar commended a squad of firemen from Garmentown for rescuing Kolcun from the wreckage before his body was burned to a crisp.

The man was admitted to the Barnesboro hospital on Sunday at 1:30 p. m. and he died at 4 a. m. on Sunday. Coroner Govekar said death resulted from a fractured skull, broken right leg and shock.

Police said Kolcun was driving north on Route 219 when his car left the highway, crashed into a tree and burst into flames. The driver was trapped in the wreckage.

Passersby succeeded in partly extinguishing the blaze and sent for a squad from nearby Garman Coal Co. The mining squad used an acetylene torch to burn a large hole in the metal roof of the car. Block and tackle equipment was erected over the roof of the car and the man was removed from the burning vehicle. Barnesboro Fire Co. also was called and helped keep down the flames while crews removed Kolcun from the demolished machine.

Coroner Govekar said Kolcun was traveling alone at the time of the accident. He said death was listed as accidental and an inquest would not be necessary. Kolcun, a veteran of World War II, had been employed as a shot firer in Mine No. 4 of the Springfield Col. During the war he served in the European Theater of Operations.

A brother, Joseph, was killed in May, 1947, in an accident in Mine 15 of the Barnes and Tucker in the past five years. He was son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Kolcun of Barnesboro R. D., who survive, as does a brother, Stephen, of Barnesboro, and two sisters, Mrs. Helen Marchessy of Spangler, and Mary Margaret, at home.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. Margaret Kolcun, Greek Catholic Church, Barnesboro, and burial was in the church cemetery.
