**Concern Is Shown  
Over Industrial  
Accidents in State**

Concern is being expressed by officials at Harrisburg over a sudden increase in the number of injuries reported by industries for the month of July reached an all-time high for the 12-month period.

Ever since March of this year there has been a downward trend, a spokesman for the department told Pennsylvania News Service, but the July figure exceeded the previous monthly figure by 5.4 per cent.

During the month, a total of 10,026 persons were injured in industrial accidents in Pennsylvania, and of this number, 106 were fatalities, which in itself was an

increase of 47.2 per cent from the preceding month.

Warningly, it was pointed out that there was a total of 8,102 injuries resulting in temporary to permanent disability were reported.

Non-manufacturing groups accounted for 61 per cent of all injuries, with 72.6 per cent of all those killed in accidents occurring in these non-manufacturing plants.

In a breakdown of injuries reported for the month, three unsafe acts—overloading, crowding and poor arrangement—accounted for 3,626 injuries, while unsafe equipment and careless use of equipment caused 2,566 casualties.

The most common kind of accident involved being struck by objects—which accounted for 33.4 per cent of all injuries reported, the department said.

**Coroner's Jury Says  
'Unavoidable Accident'**

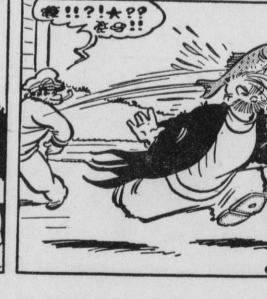
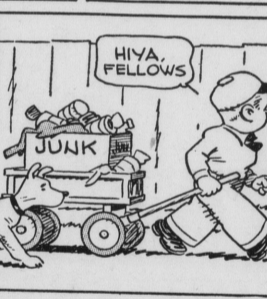
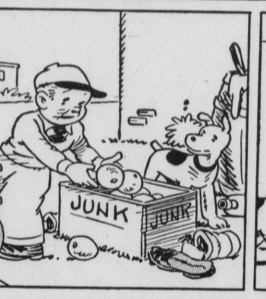
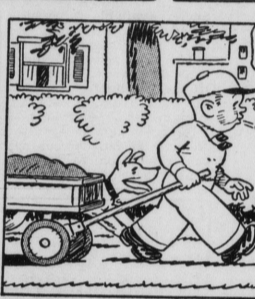
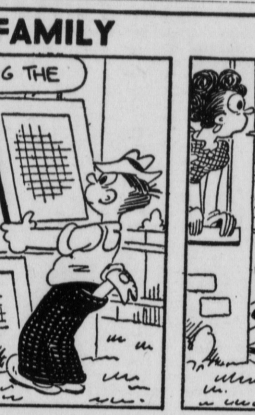
A coroner's jury last Wednesday night exonerated Stanley Cooper, 58, of Cherry Tree, of any criminal negligence in the traffic death of Frank J. Dumm, 71, Nicktown.

The inquest was held in St. Nicholas Church Hall at Nicktown by Deputy Coroner Edward Bishop. The jury said Dumm's death resulted from an unavoidable accident. Testimony showed that the aged man was fatally hurt the night of Sept. 6 when hit by a Horrell Short Way Line bus driven by Cooper.

Witnesses said Dumm was walking alongside the road and suddenly started across directly in front of the bus. The jury consisted of Frank H. Kirsch, Charles B. Ludwig, Amandus P. Kirsch, C. P. Soisson and John Nealen.
