## State's 1949 Fishing Rules Show Only Slight Change

### Legal Size Pike Limit Reduced to 16 Inches

The state fish commission announced last Thursday that the Pennsylvania fishing rules and seasons, with two minor exceptions, will remain the same next year.

C. A. French, state fish commissioner, said the agency approved these 1949 inland water seasons identical to this year's.

Trout—Brook, brown and rainbow, April 15 to July 31, 10 daily of combined species, not less than six inches long.

Bass—Small and large mouth, July 1 to Nov. 30, six daily of combined species, not less than nine inches.

Pike—Perch—July 1 to Nov. 30, six daily, not less than 12 inches.

Pickeral—July 1 to Nov. 30, six daily, not less than 12 inches.

Muskellunge—(Western pike)—July 1 to Nov. 30, two daily, not less than 24 inches.

The two changes relate to northern pike in Lake Erie remain the same with a June 15 to Nov. 30 season, 12 inch limit and a daily bag of eight.

The commission confined the taking of smelt to that part of streams emptying into Lake Erie from route 5 to the lake.

French said the move was being taken to enable the agency to provide better fishing for the increasing number of anglers in the state.

### Recommendations Made By Inspector On Visit to Dysart

**Plunkett Mine Praised For Safety Measures**

Added precautions to supplement existing safety measures, Inspector Kreischer also suggested offset installation and safety devices for the ventilating fan and preshift and weekly examinations for explosive gas and other hazards with permissible flame-safety lamps, as well as elimination of such fire and ignition hazards as using open-flame lights and smoking in the mine.

The report credited the mine with several commendable safety features. Among these were generally satisfactory timbering, frequent roof testing by the sound-and-vibration method, use of permissible explosives for all blasting, sufficient air in the working places, provision of adequate haulage clearance and shelter holes, and proper maintenance of the escapeway.

Other recommendations called for adoption of an employee-identification system, 100 percent wearing of hard toe shoes and safety headgear, and the use of goggles by employees performing work hazardous to the eyes.

### Bishop Alexander Mann Expires Early Monday

Rt. Rev. Alexander Mann, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh for 20 years, died on Monday of this week at his home in Geneva, N. Y. He served as bishop of the diocese from Jan. 25, 1923 until his retirement on Jan. 23, 1943. He was 88 years of age.

Bishop Mann, who was succeeded in the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh by Bishop Austin Fardew, served only three charges before becoming a bishop—East Buffalo, N. Y.; Orange, N. J.; and Trinity Church, Boston, Mass.

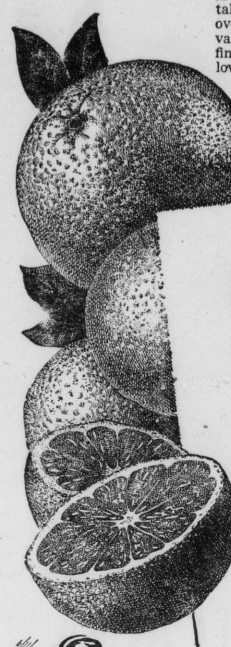
