Liquor Stores Show Big Profit In 1948

Pennsylvania's 575 liquor stores showed a net profit of \$57,390,000 in 1948—the highest in the history of the retail system.

The Liquor Control Board has announced that the 1948 profits were \$1,325,000 over the 1947 figure. Some \$38,000,000 of the profit came from the store system; the remainder came from the 10 percent state tax.

Sales volume for the year came to \$208,172,473. This was well below the record mark of more than \$234,000,000 sold in '46.

Pennsylvanians consumed about seven percent less hard liquor during the year but wine sales increased by more than 18 percent. State Stores sold more than 19,000,000 gallons of liquor and wines compared with the high point of better than 21,000,000 gallons sold in 1946.
