

Dean Twp. School Board Draws Up Schedule for Dean, Dysart Pupils

Groups Will Be Same As In Old Record Books

The Dean Twp. School Board held their monthly meeting in the Dean Grade School on Monday, Mar. 7. The following program was planned by Dr. Arthur M. Stull, county superintendent of schools, and his assistants to accommodate the students of Dysart school, which burned to the ground recently.

The Dean School will operate from 8 a. m. to 12:30 noon, with the same grouping, etc., as at present.

Students from Dysart will attend school from 12:30 noon to 5 p. m. Groupings and schools to be used are as follows:

This arrangement keeps the groups as they are today in teacher record books. Texts are the same in Dean and Dysart schools.

Additional texts will be supplied by other schools (Westmont, Southmont, Lower Yoder Twp., etc.). Tablets, pencils and other supplies are being furnished by Dean Twp. School District.

Transportation
Mr. Gregg handles Dean attendance area as at present. Except he adjusts his schedule to 8 a. m. starting time. When he brings the Dysart group to Dean at 12:30 noon, he returns Dean pupils to their homes at that time.

At noon, Mr. Gregg makes his morning trip for Dysart attendance area. When he arrives at Dysart, he takes the pupils of grades 4, 5 and 6 (total 41) to Richland. He leaves grades 4 and 5 at Richland and picks up pupils except grades 4 and 5 from the Richland attendance area and takes this load to Dean School. This situation is reversed at 5 p. m.

Mr. Basal, Ashville, will pick up grades 1, 2, 3, 7 and 8 after Gregg has arrived at Dysart and goes directly to Dean. In the evening when Mr. Basal finishes his high school trip at Dean, he waits until 5 p. m. when he brings the same group back to the Dysart attendance area.

Transportation Contracts
Mr. Gregg has extra miles at noon and the evening between Dysart and Dean. All other mileage is covered in the present contract.

A contract for three months between Dean Twp. School District and Charles Basal shall cover mileage, Ashville to Dean and return, at noon. Operators' time while waiting for 5 p. m. must be paid. Mileage for return trip already in high school transportation contract with Mr. Basal.

Mr. Basal could handle pupils between Ashville and Dysart if it will speed up transportation in the Dysart attendance area. This should not cost anything additional since he covers this mileage empty at noon and in the evening.

A large number of the citizens of the community attended the meeting.

Alvin Buck, assistant county superintendent of the schools, spent Friday, Mar. 11, at the Dean Grade School. This was the first day that the preceding program was put into effect.

The program proved a success according to Mr. Buck's report.

Better Hurry to Postoffice With '49 Automobile License Application

If you're one of Pennsylvania's 1,200,000 motor vehicle owners who have failed so far to mail their applications for 1949 license tags—you'd better get on the ball, brother, and mail it without further delay.

Motorists of the Keystone State have until midnight, Mar. 31, to use their 1948 automobile license tags and after that—!

Well, in the first place after that the 1948 tags are illegal, says the State Dept. of Revenue.

And after that—motorists driving their cars with 1948 tags are "open game" for the Pennsylvania State Police.

And furthermore, the Pennsylvania State Police right now are operating at full authorized strength of 1,600 troopers—all of which means simply that the wayward motorist will find himself more than "in the spot."

To those wiseful souls looking for an extension of the Mar. 31 deadline, the Dept. of Revenue says "nix," with Acting Secretary Otto F. Messner tartly warning:

"There definitely will be no extension of the period."

One department worker—some what mathematically inclined—has figured that to issue the remaining tags before the Apr. 1 deadline will require the issuance of 61,227 tags a day, which is no small matter.

Tags are sent third-class mail and applicants sending in their applications last week need not expect their tags in time, cautions the department.

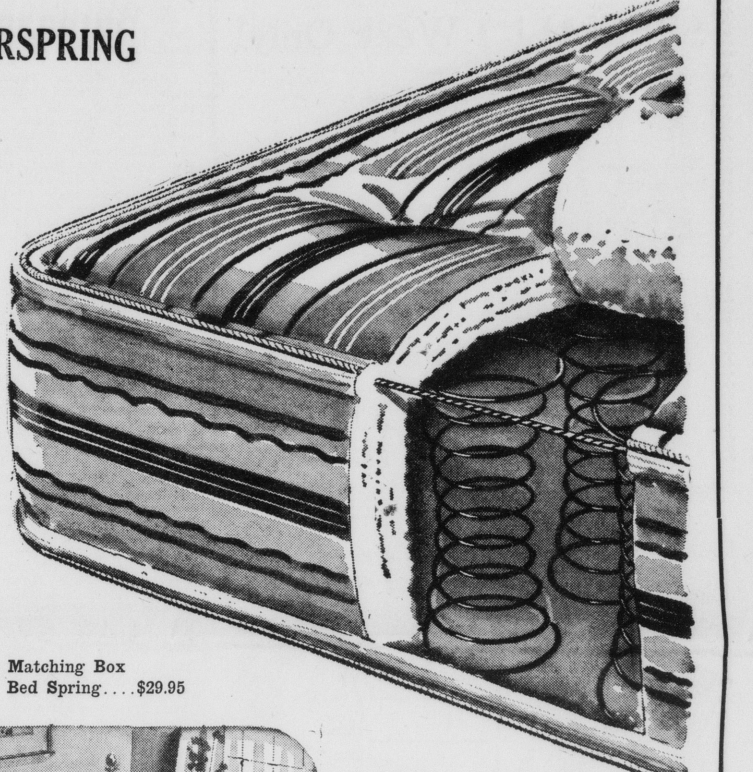

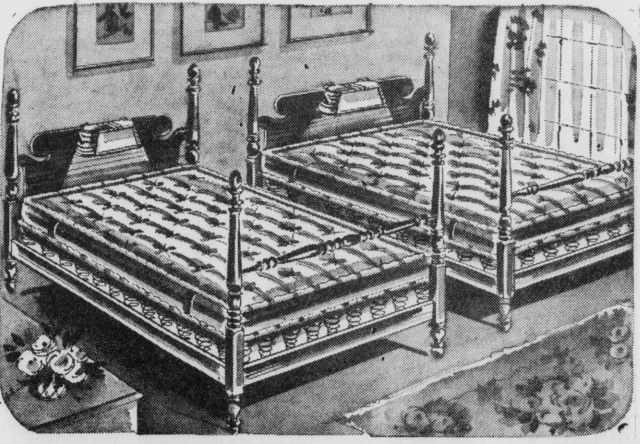

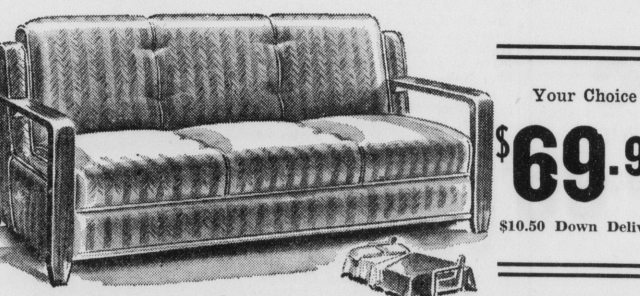
