25-Mile Speed Law OK'd for Cresson: A 25-mile-per-hour speed limit on Route 53 in Cresson was set by the borough council on Monday evening of this week. This restriction was put into force to cut speeding on Second Street, as the route is known, and through Cresson. Councilmen said the new speed limit will be strictly enforced.

Plans also were discussed for carrying out street improvements. It is hoped to complete work this year on several sidewalk repair and curb installation projects.

A petition was received from residents of Second Street, and Columbus Avenue—where a dangerous S-curve is located. The petition asks that the curve be eliminated.

Councilmen explained they have asked State Highway Department officials in Harrisburg to have the curve taken out, but no definite action has been taken. The petition will be forwarded to the state officials.
