Oliver Strittmatter of New York City spent several days during the past week as the guest of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Strittmatter.

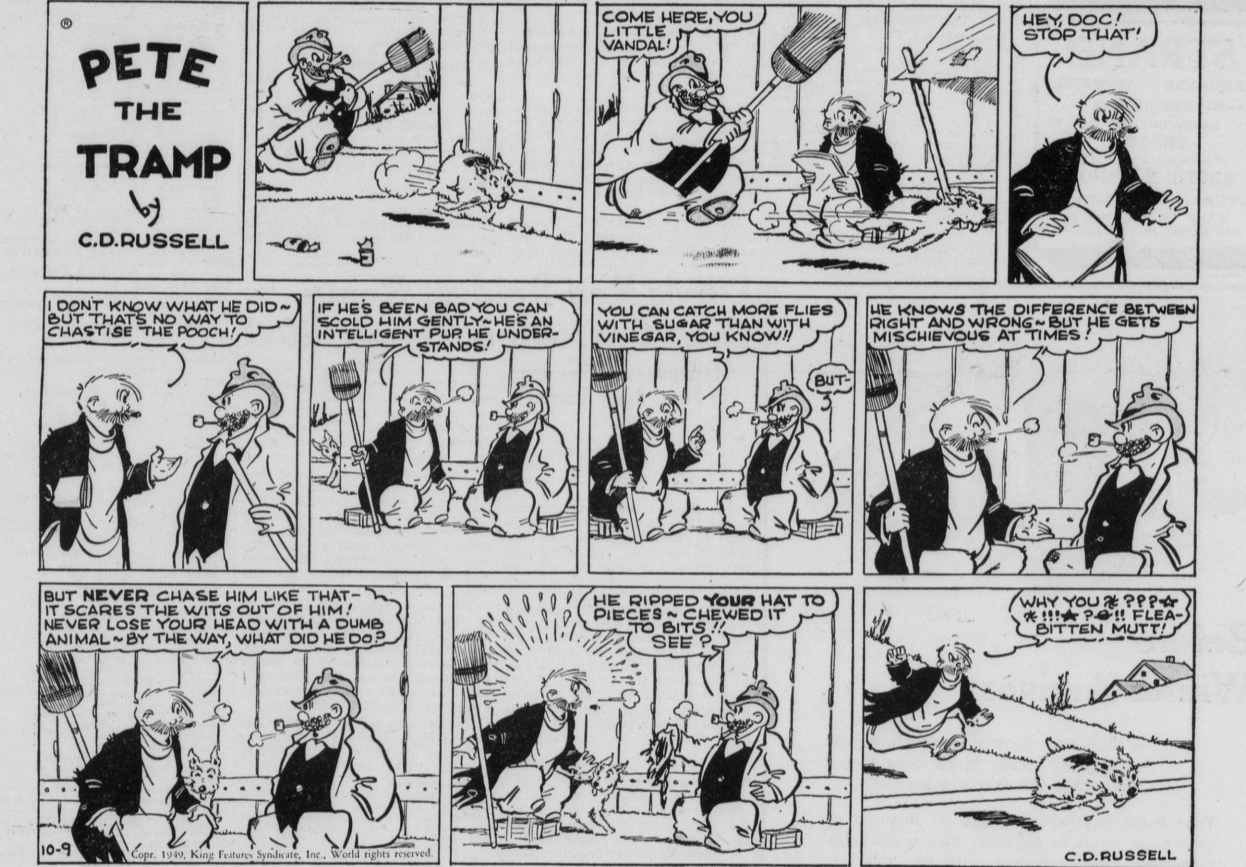

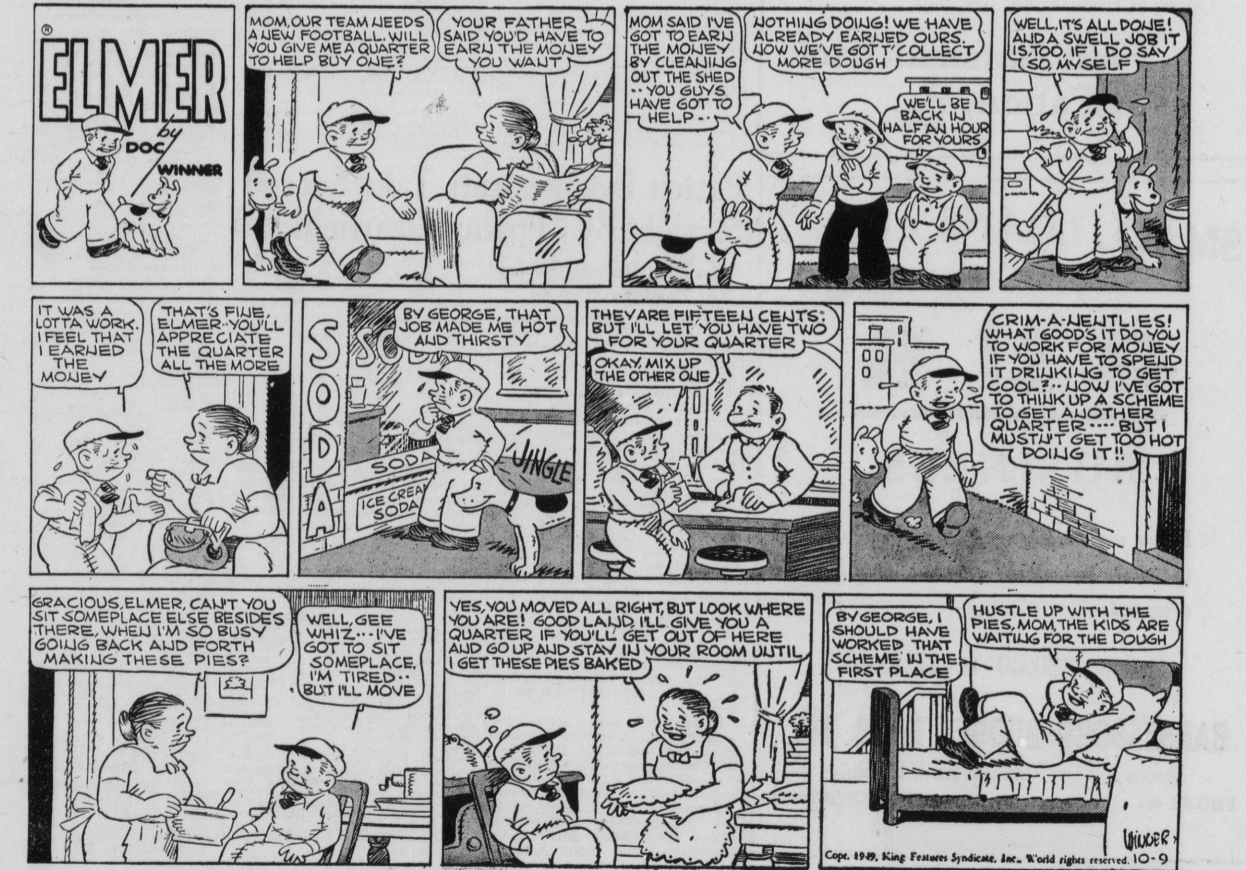
