Game Commission Worried

The Pennsylvania Game Commission is worried about the possibility of a mysterious disease that has appeared in bordering states decimating the common-wealth's deer population.

Thomas D. Frye, commission executive secretary, said no trace of the disease had been found among deer in this state up to last week.

"But we're keeping an extremely close watch on the situation, Frye said. "Something like this could be an epidemic among the deer in a matter of days if it got a good start.

Both West Virginia and Maryland have reported mysterious epidemics in deer herds in those states. More than 200 of a herd of 2,000 on the Aberdeen Proving Ground at Aberdeen, Md, were destroyed by the disease. In West Virginia, state agriculture department officials said an unidentificed malady killed more than 200 of the animals.



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
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
