Carrolltown High School Pins 23-7 Defeat On Altoona High 'B' Team

Vince Malloy Crosses For 2 Scores Friday

The Mountaineers of Carrolltown High School staged a rip-roaring comeback on Friday afternoon when they defeated the Altoona High School "B" team, 23-7, in a game played at Mansion Park, Altoona. The Mountaineers now have a record of three wins against five defeats. Carrolltown got off to a fast start when they recovered an Altoona fumble on the Altoona 33 yard line, on the first scrimmage play of the game. After three running plays the winners pushed the ball to the Altoona 17. On the next play Carrolltown fumbled and Altoona recovered on their own 18. Following three plays, Altoona went into punt formation and a bad pass from center saw the ball in the end zone, pushing the Mountaineers ahead, 2-0, on a safety.

On the following kickoff Bob Volk took the ball on the Altoona 20 yard line and fought his way to the Carrolltown 43. Then the loser's intercepted a Mountaineer pass and after gaining little yardage through tight Carrolltown defense, punted to the Carrolltown 10 yard line. Bob Volk then smashed through center to his own 16 and Vince Malloy, on the next play, went to the Carrolltown 29 on an end run. On the next play Vince Malloy whipped a 19 yard pass to Ned Westrick, who caught the ball on his own 45 and raced up the sidelines to the enemy 26. The following play placed the oval on the enemy 13 where Quarterback Dick Cellini scored the seventh point on a center plunge.

St. Benedict's Wins 20-Victory Friday Nite Over Heilwood

The Parochials of St. Benedict's in Carrolltown chalked up their fourth win of the season last Friday night, under the lights of the Carrolltown High School Stadium, when they ran over the Heilwood Boys' Team, 20-0. The Parochials have lost three games this season with Indiana and Ernest remaining to be played. Right Halfback Ronnie Myers sparked for the Parochials as he made all of Carrolltown's TD's on long runs. With neither team pushing the ball into scoring position in the first quarter, Carrolltown opened up as Duane Luther took the ball on his own 38 and went to the Heilwood 48. Two plays later the Parochials went to the enemy 30 where Myers crashed through for the first TD from 30 yards out. Luther made good the extra on a plunge. Carrolltown came back again in the third period as the hard running of Jim Kelly, Bob Sharbaugh, Luther and Myers placed the oval on the enemy 10 where Myers went over, to clinch a 68 yard drive. Jim Kelly made good the extra on a quarterback sneak.

In the final minutes of the final chapter Ronnie Myers took the ball on his own 42 yard line and raced around end for 58 yards and the final score. Jim Kelly's pass to J. D. Buck for the extra point fell short by inches. The Parochial line sparked on both offense and defense, giving St. Benedict's a very wide margin in net yardage gained, 264 to Heilwood's 44. The winners also held a comfortable 12-2 edge in first downs. St. Benedict's did not complete any of 4 pass tries and Heilwood made good 2 of 11 heaves. The summary:

Ebensburg Shades Indiana By Close 2-0 Score Friday

Ebensburg High shaded Indiana by a margin of a fourth-quarter safety to score a 2-0 win last Friday evening in the Ebensburg Stadium. With less than three minutes of play remaining, the Red Devils had driven 58 yards only to be stopped inches short of a first down on the one-yard line. After the Indians failed to gain on one line play, they went into punt formation but a bad pass from center sailed out of the end zone for an automatic safety.

Coach Jimmy Cook's charges had only one other scoring threat. After stopping an Indiana scoring chance on their own 18 yard line, the Devils shook Quarterback Bonora loose for 56 yards. But that run went for naught when Ebensburg fumbled on the next play and Indiana recovered on their own 20.

Ebensburg fumbled three times during the night and the invaders grabbed all of them. First downs were even at 9-9 but the Red Devils held a wide edge in total yardage, 205 to 96. Indiana made good one of 8 passes and Ebensburg did not try a single aerial all evening.

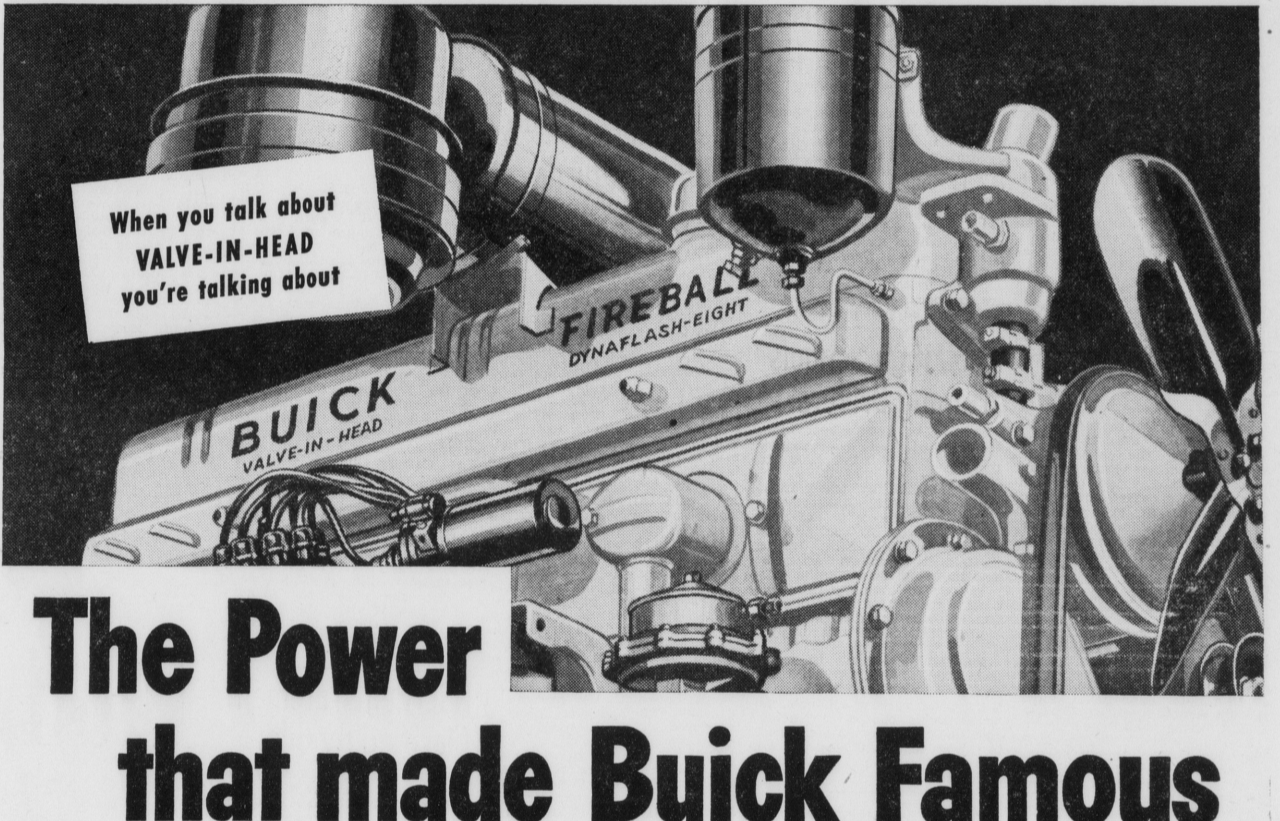
