John Serafin Secretary Of Local Church Group

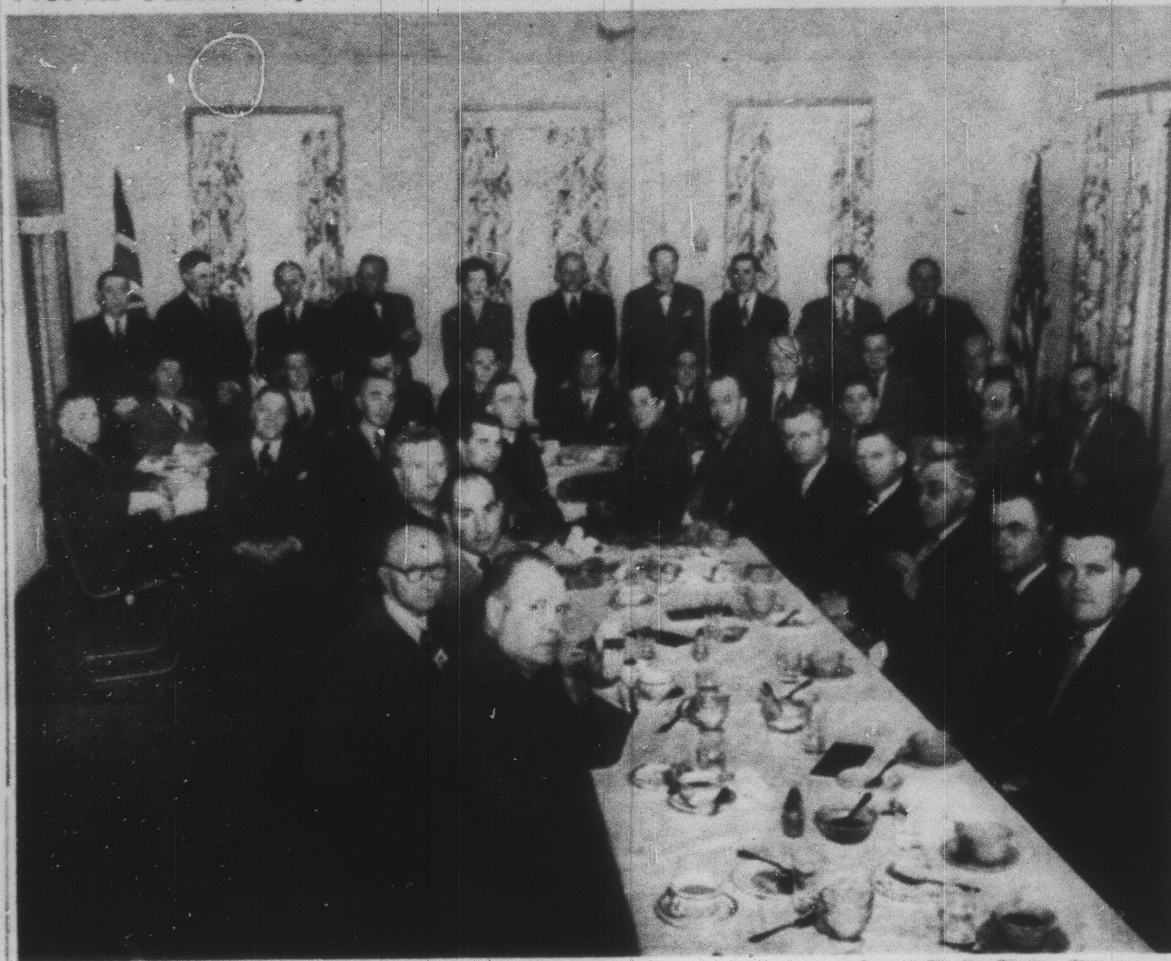

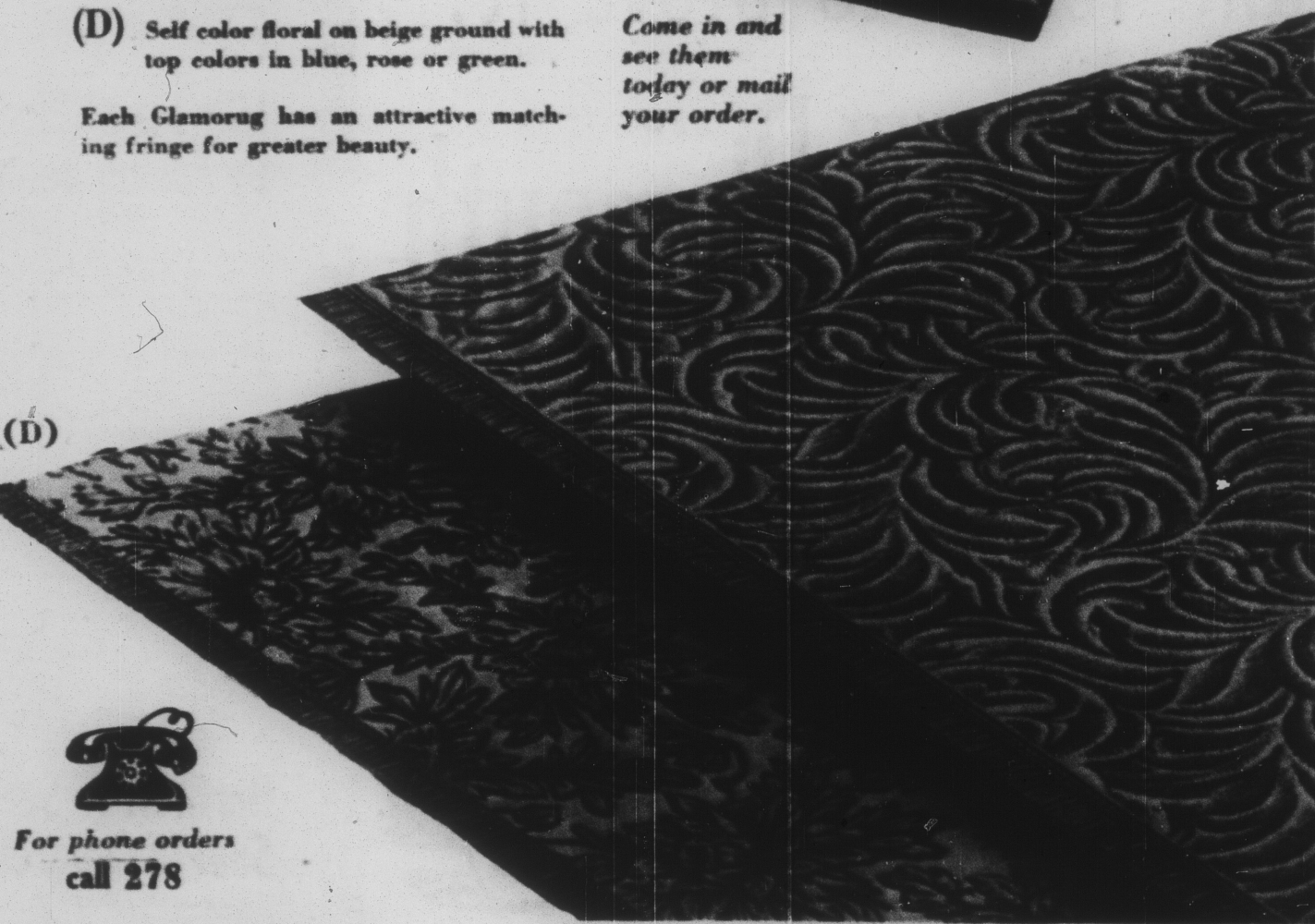
