## 2 North Cambrians On All-Star Clinic, Game Committee

Two members of the Cambria County Coaches Association, both North Cambria men, are members of a committee in charge of a football clinic, Aug. 9 through 11, and a All-Star football game

on Aug. 12, sponsored by the county coaches association. The two members are John Nevins, head grid coach at Hastings High, and George Magulick, head mentor at Barnesboro High. They are both members of the football committee of the association and will be in charge of refreshments on the clinic committee.

The all-star clash will top-off the program, and will be held at the Point Stadium in Johnstown or the Windber Stadium.

Biggie Munn, head coach at Michigan State, is expected to run the clinic. He will be assisted by other members of the Spartan coaching staff. A trainer from the district will also be on hand to demonstrate methods of first aid and other fundamentals. A trainer may need on the gridiron

The all-star teams will be composed of seniors from last year's district high school squads. Each team will be composed of 22 men and will practice for two weeks preceding the game. Two coaches from each section, North and South, will be selected to tutor the players.

The division line separating the district will be decided at the Mar 6 meeting of the association. The

members of the unit will select players. The proceeds of the game will be used for the advancement of interscholastic athletics and charitable purposes. It was also announced that each player will receive an individual award for participating in the event.
