Cherry Tree Man State Paul Bunyan

Joel McCreery Once Called Sullivan's Bluff

Miss V. I. Small, secretary of the Pennsylvania Folklore Society, State Museum in Harrisburg, reports that Pennsylvania had a Paul Bunyan, or super woodsman, in the person of "Cherry Tree Joe McCreery." "His heroic deeds from Cherry Tree to Williamsport were sung in every lumber camp and mountain cabin," Miss Small said. "His super-human breaking of a log jam at Buttermilk Falls, his calling John L. Sullivan's bluff at a hotel in Renova, his carrying a raft, single handed, off Geary's Rocks, and floating it, are only a few of his reported exploits.

"Born on Muncy Creek in 1805, he followed the river for 40 years, every year a memorable one, dying in 1895 at the age of 90, in the midst of the great river saga. He is buried near his old home at Cherry Tree and his grave is still visited by veterans of the log drives and rafting."
