St. Francis Loses To Hartwick In Final Minutes

St. Francis College of Loretto lost its second game in as many days of play last Thursday to Hartwick College at Oneonta, N. Y., 66-62, in the final two minutes of the contest. Siena took the measure of the Red Flash squad, 66-43, last Tuesday night in the Empire State.

2-Week Open Deer Season Considered By Commission

The Pennsylvania Game Commission may permit a full open season this year on both does and bucks for the first time since 1940.

Thomas D. Frye, commission executive secretary, said last week that there is considerable sentiment among members of the commission to open the season on all deer but yearlings this year. The spike buck or yearling would be protected to continue propagation in the state, Frye said.

Ross L. Leffler, commission president, also said he favored allowing hunters to kill does and bucks with two or more points to one antler.

Frye said there are too many deer in Pennsylvania. He claimed the state woodlands should support a herd numbering no more than 350,000, and authorities put the number of deer in the state at more than 700,000.

Most of the opposition to an open season on does has been built up on sentiment over a long period, Frye said.

He went on to say that the sentiment is exhausted now due to the fact and in view of all the reports of damage caused by the animals.

One of the big problems the commission faces, if it decides to permit shooting of all but spike bucks this year, concerns the length of season. There is an excellent chance that it might be cut sharply if the decision is in favor of an open season on both does and bucks. In 1940 a two-week open season was declared and 40,000 deer with antlers were bagged, contrasted with the 145,580 antlerless animals that were bagged.

The commission will make its decision at its July meeting.

Lilly Cops 40-32 Cage Decision Over Gallitzin Hi

Lilly High moved up to second place in Northern Cambria League competition last Friday evening when they walked off with a 40-32 victory over the Gallitzin High Gremlins on the Red Flasher's floor. 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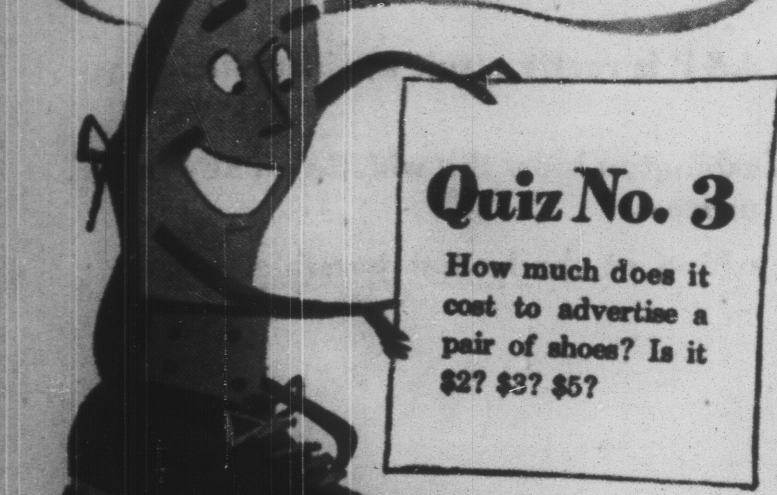
