Nanty-Glo, Revloc Mine Stores Sold

Two 32-year-old company stores were sold last week—Heisley Store at Nanty-Glo and the Revloc Supply Co. store.

Sam Bankin of Revloc purchased the places of business. He will operate the Revloc store as a private business venture but has closed the one in Nanty-Glo and will liquidate its merchandise. The two stores were included in a deal last year by which Bethlehem Steel Co. acquired the Monroe Coal Co., Revloc, and the Heisley Coal Co., Nanty-Glo. The steel company since has disposed

of two other properties purchased from the J. H. Weaver Co. These two were in Hellwood, Pa., and in Dawson, W. Va.
