Cambria Rates High In Surplus Foods

Cambria County's share of the surplus foods is larger than that of any other county in the state. The county has been granted

652,700 pounds of surplus foods, including potatoes, powdered eggs and dried milk. In all, more than four million pounds of potatoes, eggs and milk have been earmarked for the 77,965 Pennsylvania families who were involved in the soft coal strike.

It was estimated by the State Property and Supplies Department in Harrisburg, that three more months will be needed before miners' families and others will be self-sufficient. Thirty-one counties in the state have applied for this aid.

Cambria's share includes 494,700 pounds of potatoes, 32,000 pounds of dried eggs and 126,000 pounds of milk.
