Seton Hill Founder Dies Of Broken Hip

The first president of the famed Seton Hill College, Greensburg, Mother Mary Joseph, died last Sunday in a Pittsburgh Hospital.

Born Kate Harvey in Pittsburgh, Mother Mary Joseph entered the Sisters of Charity Order in 1880. She taught for a number of years in Pittsburgh parochial schools and served as principal of several.

She was assigned as treasurer of Seton Hill community in 1909 and in 1915 became its mother superior. Three years later the college was chartered and Mother Mary Joseph became its president.

In 1933 she was named superior of education for Pittsburgh Diocesan schools and served in that capacity until 1937.

She fractured her hip six weeks ago.

Funeral services were held yesterday in the Seton Hill College Chapel at 9 a. m. and interment was made in the college cemetery.
