

### Dr. Adler to Speak At Reade Township Commencement

#### Class of 1950 Will Graduate On May 24

Dr. Frank F. Adler, educator and sociologist, will speak at the 49th annual commencement exercises of the Reade Township High School on Wednesday evening, May 24. The exercises will be held at 8 o'clock in the school auditorium at Mountandale.

Dr. Adler will speak on "Timber for a New World." He was educated in the United States and abroad, and specializes in sociology, adult education and child psychology.

Lloyd Troxell, secretary of the school board, will present diplomas to 29 students, who comprise the 1950 senior class.

Calvin B. Stein, supervising principal, announced that Sally Lovell and Patricia Troxell will be the class speakers. Rev. R. L. Snyder will pronounce the invocation and benediction.

Plans are now underway for the baccalaureate services, to be held on Sunday evening, May 21, at 8 p. m. in the high school auditorium.

Mr. Stein announced that two speakers will share the rostrum for the services. They are Rev. Father Edward McConnel, pastor of St. Richard's Catholic Church in Blandburg, and Rev. Budd R. Smith, pastor of the First Evangelical United Brethren Church in Tyrone.

Music will be furnished by the high school chorus, directed by Miss Marian Kring. Miss Kring is the high school music teacher.

Officers of the class are: Harry Cree, president; Susan Gwin, secretary; and Janet Kuhn, treasurer. The class sponsor is Floyd F. Deas.

### Gallitzin Tot, 2 1/2, In Critical Condition From Bullet Wound

Little Linda Ann Zerbee, 2 1/2, of Gallitzin was taken to the Altoona Hospital early Tuesday evening after apparently shooting herself in the stomach with a .38-cal. revolver. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo J. Zerbee of 408 Cleveland St.

Following her arrival at the hospital, she underwent several operations and was given transfusions and placed in an oxygen tent. The bullet pierced her abdomen and came out through her back, narrowly missing her spine.

Linda Ann was found by her mother on the floor of her home about 5 p. m. She was said to have been shot by a pistol used earlier in the day for target practice by other members of the family. All the target shooters had returned and placed the revolver on a table. One of those using the gun said he was "sure" all bullets had been fired and none were left unexploded in the weapon.

At the time of the shooting, Linda Ann and her younger brother were alone in their home. Mrs. Zerbee had left the house to remove clothing from a line in the yard.

Mrs. Zerbee said she heard the shot and ran into the house to find Linda Ann on the floor and her brother playing nearby. At first it was thought that the boy had fired the gun, but later it was discovered that the bullet had entered the girl's stomach and emerged through her back, with the theory advanced that she had pulled the trigger accidentally while examining the gun.

### Uniform Buyers Warned Of 'Gyp'

The Pennsylvania State Police warned last week all buyers of uniforms for hospitals, restaurants and beauty shops against a "gyp" artist who is believed to be operating in this section of the state. The police said the smooth-talking man exhibits a catalogue, takes an order and cash deposit and then fails to fill the orders.

### Coal Mining Towns Will Reflect Drop

#### Census Takers Estimate Population Decreases

While the census count in this district is incomplete, indications are that the final figures will disclose a population drop in nearly all coal mining towns.

The decrease, it is said, results from a number of factors. Among these are mechanization of mines, thus requiring fewer employees; a loss of coal markets to other fuels, and the exodus of the sons of miners to communities offering steadier employment in other industries.

In many instances, the drop in population in mining towns is expected to be more than 5 per cent, which is considered normal. The U. S. Census Bureau figures that anything above a 5 per cent increase in population or more than a 5 per cent decrease is abnormal.

Some of the biggest population increases will come from townships and boroughs adjacent to Johnstown, it is reported.

### Regular Army Enlistments Open for 2-Year 'Hit'

U. S. Regular Army enlistments are increasing daily with the implementation of the two-year enlistment now in force. Capt. J. H. Singleton of the U. S. Army Recruiting Main Station, Post Office Bldg., Altoona, has announced that all eligible applicants may now enter the Regular Army for a minimum of two years. Eligibles include men 17 to 35 who apply for an initial enlistment in the Army. Three day furloughs can be authorized for men desiring to clear up any personal affairs necessary prior to leaving Altoona for their assignment.

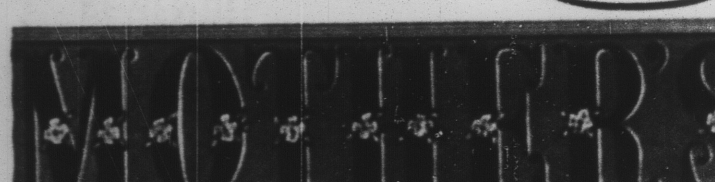

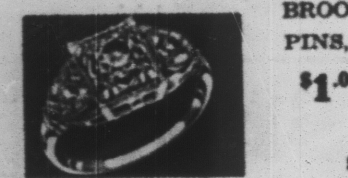

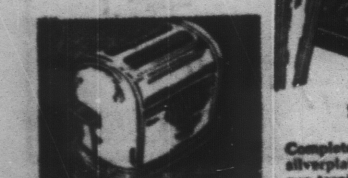
