32 North Cambria Seniors To Graduate At St. Francis

Carrolltown, Cresson Co-Eds Part of Class

A total of 32 North Cambria students will be graduated from St. Francis College, Loretto, this coming Sunday, May 28. Nineteen district students will receive bachelor of arts degrees while the remaining 13 will get bachelor of science degrees.

Two co-eds, Lucille Marie McNulty of Carrolltown, and Betty Lou Powers of Cresson, will receive degrees in biology and Spanish, respectively. They are among the first co-eds to be enrolled in the Loretto college.

This year's graduating class set a new record for the 102-year old North Cambria Institution. The class of 124 students is the largest in the history of the college and tops last year's mark by more than 60 students.

Rev. Father Adrian J. M. Veigle, T.O.C., president of the college, announced the list of graduates last week. He said the graduation plans are as yet not completed but this Sunday, May 28, has been set as commencement day.

Six North Cambria students to receive sheepskins completed their education last February, but the degrees will not be conferred until Sunday's ceremonies are held.
