Although it is taken for granted today, the radio, Mr. Bender believes, is the greatest advancement of this age. His firm pioneered in radio work, having placed the first sets in Cambria County.

With the advent of radio in 1920, the Bender firm took on the radio work. Then in 1922 it became the Carrolltown Battery & Auto Co. operated by H. E. Bender and his son, Bede. Finally in 1929 it was changed again to Bender Electric Co.

The firm grew so consistently that it now employs 50 persons, 40 of whom are from Carrolltown. Associated with Mr. Bender are three brothers—Herman and Maurice, both of Carrolltown, and Alvin, Ebensburg.

It was in 1929 when the firm began to specialize in Frigidaire refrigeration equipment. The company sells domestic and commercial appliances as well as store and tavern fixtures. Mr. Bender said the firm has installed equipment in about 1,200 commercial places and 12,000 homes since it took over the refrigeration business.

Mr. Bender's favorite recreation is reading and movies. He is a member of Fox-Peale Post, American Legion, Carrolltown; Barnboro VFW, Johnstown 40 et 8; Patton Eagles, Barnsboro; Moose, Carrolltown; Lions, Barnsboro; Knights of Columbus and the Holy Name Society of St. Benedict's Church, Carrolltown.

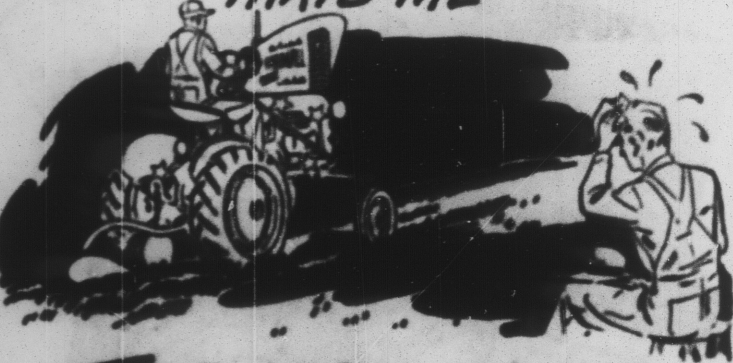
