3-Year Draft Bill Gets Approval Of Senate Committee
The United States Senate Armed Services Committee during the past week voted to give the administration the full three-year extension of the draft law it asked, including power for the President to order inductions resumed at any time.

It differs widely from the so-called "draftless draft" bill passed by the House on May 24. The House voted to shift the draft to standby status, with nobody put in uniform through Selective Service unless Congress, in later legislation, gave authority to do so.

5 North Cambria Men Said Involved In Gasoline Thefts
400 Gallons Reported Missing By Strip Firms
Four residents of Hastings and one St. Benedict man are being held for court on charges of being involved in a series of gasoline and oil thefts in recent months. Included in the charges are burglary, larceny and receiving stolen goods.

State police last Friday announced the arrest of William J. LaBelle, 20, Gordon, McIlwain, 24; Edward C. Forberger, 25, and Jack McMurray, 31, all of Hastings, and Howard Lytle Jr., 22, of St. Benedict.

At preliminary hearings before Mrs. Elizabeth Rowland the defendant pleaded guilty to charges against them as follows: LaBelle—Burglary at the Elder Coal Co. larceny at Holtz Coal Co. and larceny at B & B Construction; Lytle—Burglary at Elder Coal Co.; Forberger—Burglary at Sinclair Oil Co. larceny at Holtz Coal Co. and larceny at B & B Construction; McMurray—larceny at Holtz Coal Co., receiving stolen goods from the Sinclair and the B & B thefts.

Coal company officials said the thefts had been occurring regularly for many months and the losses began to be exceptionally heavy during April and early May. Several hundred gallons were reportedly stolen over an extended period of time prior to April.
