Cambria Judging Team Gets State Honors in Contest

A Cambria County team made up of two boys and one girl, two of whom are from the Northern Cambria area, Tuesday captured statewide honors in the livestock judging contest at State College.

The County team took first place in the competition during the 26th annual 4-H Club Week observance on the Penn State College campus. Another Cambria County team, with one boy representing the North Cambria section, won sixth place in the swine judging.

It was the fourth time within recent years that the county team has won the livestock judging contest. This year's team were trained by H. C. McWilliams, the county farm agent, and Amos S. Zimmerman, assistant county agent.

Members of the state championship team are Joseph Leiden, St. Lawrence, Leonard Hogue, Loretto, and Tilly Makin of Portage R. D.

In winning the state title, the county team also won the right to represent Pennsylvania at the International Livestock Show later this year in Chicago.

Mr. McWilliams said the winning team will take part in the international competition in the midwestern city late in November and early in December.

Members of the team placing in the swine judging contest include Marjorie Griffith of Colver; Wendell Hunt of Conemaugh R. D., and Robert Thomas of Ebensburg.

Blandburg Man Meted Sentence by Co. Court

A six months to one year sentence was imposed in court at Ebensburg on Monday in the case of William Turner of Blandburg who was convicted of robbery by a criminal court jury during the June sessions. The sentence, deferred at the conclusion of trial, was imposed by Judge Ivan McKonrick.

Turner was convicted of attacking and robbing J. H. McCurtney of Blandburg in a hotel there early in May. He already has served about three months of his minimum sentence. He was also directed to make restitution in the amount of \$25.
