Sterling No. 1 Mine Cited In Report By U. S. Inspector

Citing satisfactory timbering, ventilation, coal-dust control and handling a reinspection report released Saturday by the U. S. Bureau of Mines proposes only four further safeguards to bring Sterling No. 1 mine - Sterling Coal Co., Bakerton, into full conformance with the Federal Mine Safety Code.

The mine employed 296 men and averaged 1,600 tons of coal a day when Inspector David K. Kreischer examined it the last of August.

The inspector's only recommendations were for firing all blasting shots immediately after charging on shift, providing overload protection for seven trolley locomotives and wearing protective hats and footwear by all employees.

Inspector Kreischer listed between-inspection improvements as testing for gas before and after firing each shot when blasting on shift, using drag on the rear of loaded trips climbing grades during gathering operations, and the wearing of goggles for eye-hazardous work.

The inspector's only recommendations were for firing all blasting shots immediately after charging on shift, providing overload protection for seven trolley locomotives and wearing protective hats and footwear by all employees.
