Coal Mine Explosion to Be Touched Off At Bruceton

Mine Bureau to Give Demonstration Oct. 28

A violent explosion will be touched off on Saturday morning, Oct. 28, at Bruceton, Pa., near Pittsburgh, when the U. S. Bureau of Mines gives public demonstrations of the dangers of uncontrolled bituminous dust in coal mines.

The spectacular coal-dust blast, one of a series to be arranged that day, will occur at the Bureau's Experimental Coal Mine and will be observed by miners, mine operators, safety and supervisory officials, students and the general public.

Those who witness the display will be absolutely safe, said the Regional Director, H. P. Greenwald, who explained that many protective measures have been adopted and that Bureau scientists arranging the demonstration know exactly how far the explosion will travel.

Bruceton, site of the Experimental Coal Mine and Explosives-Testing Laboratories of the Bureau, is 13 miles south of Pittsburgh.

In preparing for the major blast, the Bureau will spread 700 pounds of coal dust in the mine entry and explode it with a stick of dynamite, a nonpermissible explosive. Dynamite is extremely hazardous to use in coal mines because it readily ignites combustible coal dust.

Research also shows that dynamite will ignite explosive mixtures of gas and air sometimes encountered in coal mines.

Demonstrations at the Experimental Mine Oct. 28 will begin at 10:30 a. m. They will include tests of permissible (approved) explosives which are recommended by the Bureau for use in coal mines.

Explosions caused by dangerous black blasting powder, a gas explosion, ignition of coal dust by electric arcs and prevention of such accidents by the application of protective rock dust.

In climaxing this series of interesting events, the Bureau will set off the final and largest explosion which will see billowing flames shooting from the mouth of the mine for several hundred feet and scattering a mine car and all else in their destructive path.

Only at the Experimental Coal Mine can these safety demonstrations be observed, for the Bureau is the sole agency in the world operating such a testing station.

Opened in 1911, this mine has proved on a large scale the findings of extensive laboratory research which has resulted in increased safety in coal mines by the widespread use of rock dust in bituminous coal mines to make coal dust nonexplosive.
