## 28th Division Men To Get Furloughs On December 23

Almost all members of Pennsylvania's 28th National Guard Division will receive 10-day Christmas furloughs from Camp Atterbury, Ind. Maj. Gen. Daniel B. Sticker says only a few troops will remain at the huge camp to form a security detachment.

The furloughs will begin Dec. 23 and continue through Jan. 1. The number of men who will have to form the security detachment will be announced sometime this week.

Sticker said a census of all the 28th division soldiers will be taken soon to facilitate transportation of 'the biggest mass movement of troops on leave at one time.'

The leave policy came as a result of an order from Washington suspending all army training for the 10-day period. A partial December pay will be given the 28th's troops before they go on furlough. The normal army payroll is at the end of the month.

The furlough order will affect many men in the North Cambria area who are serving with the federalized division.
