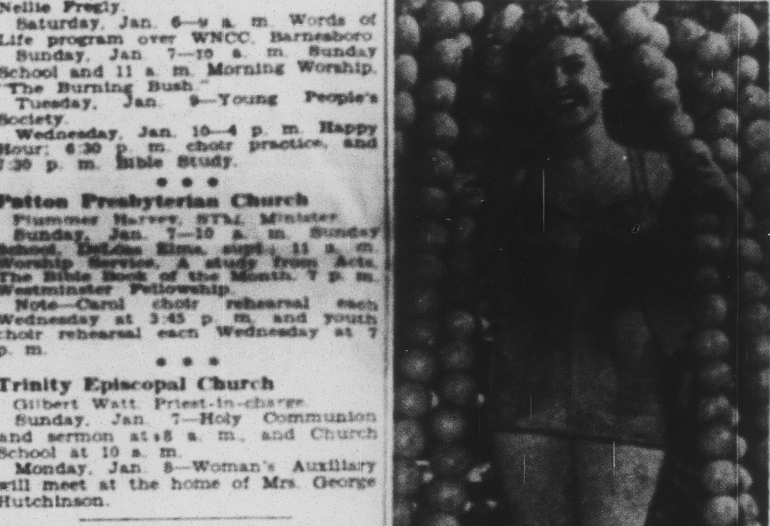

one double-holiday with New Years on a Monday. New Years' celebrations were curbed somewhat because of Sunday.

Second of the double headers is Lincoln's birthday, February 12, which falls on a Monday. The third is Labor Day fixed by law for the first Monday of September and therefore good for a two day rest from the job any year.

Armistice Day, a legal holiday in Pennsylvania, but not widely observed, falls on the second Sunday of November which probably will shift patriotic parades and programs to Monday, Nov. 12.

Lent and Easter arrive exceptionally early this year. Ash Wednesday falls on Feb. 7 instead of Feb. 22, as last year.

Easter Sunday is March 25, the earliest since 1940, when it fell on March 24. Only in four other years in the last century and a

half has Easter been earlier. The earliest was March 22, 1818. In three other years—1845, 1856 and 1913—Easter came on March 23.

Thursday will claim as many holidays this year as any other holiday. Starting off will be Washington's Birthday on Mar. 22. Next Thursday holiday will be Flag Day, June 14. The third is Thanksgiving, a Thursday holiday in any year.

Wednesday also will claim three holidays this year. America will honor its heroic dead on Wednesday, May 30, Memorial Day. Patriotic songs will celebrate the birth of a nation on Wednesday, July 4. Halloween will also fall on a Wednesday in 1951.

Christmas, this year, will fall on a Tuesday. Columbus Day, Oct. 12, is on a Friday. For the superstitious, they will have no more to fear in '51 than in 1950.

The new year brings only two Fridays, the 19th, the same number as last year. The first falls in April and the other in July.

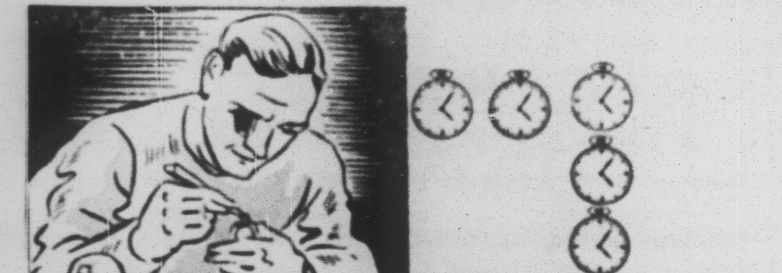
