

## Carrolltown Bank Soon To Mark 50th Birthday

Very often people look upon business and industries merely as business ventures for profit. They frequently fail to realize that a business means service to people. Service to people definitely is the aim of the First National Bank of Carrolltown. This year has a special significance to the Northern Cambria institution. It soon will complete 50 years of service to the residents of the area.

The institution opened for business on June 17, 1901, although it was incorporated the previous April 30. The bank as an institution, however, may be said to date back to 1858. From that time until the First National Bank was organized in 1901, the Johnson & Buck private bank, known as the Carrolltown Bank, was operated at the site. When the First National Bank of Carrolltown was organized, the new firm bought out the old bank together with its property.

A. W. Buck, a former resident of Carrolltown, was instrumental in organizing the First National Bank of Carrolltown. He was cashier of First National Bank in Ebensburg and saw the need of a National Bank in Carrolltown. On April 30, 1901, he met with a group of citizens to form a National Bank.
