The Colver Public School recently added two more wins to their undefeated season's record and remain in first place in the Cambria County Grade School basketball league. The Little Colts pushed aside Cresson, 44-21 on Jan. 10, and then upset Patton, 92-28 on Jan. 10.

John Rubish is still pacing the Colver lads as the high scorer. He dumped in 26 points in the Patton game and added 20 more points to his record in the Patton contest. 1951 Seasons Set At State Game Commission Meet

Decisions on the 1961 hunting seasons and election of officers featured a meeting of the State Game Commission recently.

Small game season will open on Nov. 1 and has tentatively been set to extend the full month of November. Bear season will open on Nov. 19 and deer season will come in on Dec. 3.

Ross L. Leffer, Pittsburgh, was reelected president. Robert Lamm, Erie, was reelected vice president, and Thomas D. Frye, Camp Hill, executive director.

Details on seasons and bag limits for various kinds of game and fur-bearers will be decided in July after the commission has collected all available information on the state's wildlife population.

At its January meeting, the commission returned the red fox to the bounty list. A \$4 bounty will be paid on red foxes killed in the state on and after June 1 this year.

Bounty will not be paid on gosaws killed on or after June 1. Beginning then, a \$5 reward will be paid on any great horned owl, either adult or fledgling.

The present bounty of \$1 on weasels and \$4 on gray foxes will be continued.

For the first time in district history local basketball fans are boasting of an "almost" major basketball team. This was reflected in statistics recently released by the N. C. A. B. According to the nationwide basketball group, teams playing major opponents for at least half of their schedule are listed as major college basketball teams. St. Francis College of Loretto, winners of six out of their last eight starts, play against major basketball powers for one quarter of its schedule. Of its 23 games, St. Francis plays six major opponents. They are Creighton, St. Francis (Brooklyn), Seton Hall, Virginia Tech, Georgetown and Siena. Against this opposition the Frankies captured victories over Creighton (65-52), St. Francis of Brooklyn (73-71), and Virginia Tech (73-65). Their only setback was administered by Georgetown (59-80), in the early part of the season.

Gallitzin Drops To Altoona Cath.

Altoona Catholic High School held Gallitzin to only five field goals while taking a 35-23 victory last week in Altoona.

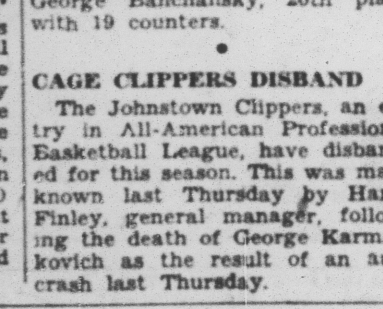
CAGE CLIPPERS DISBAND

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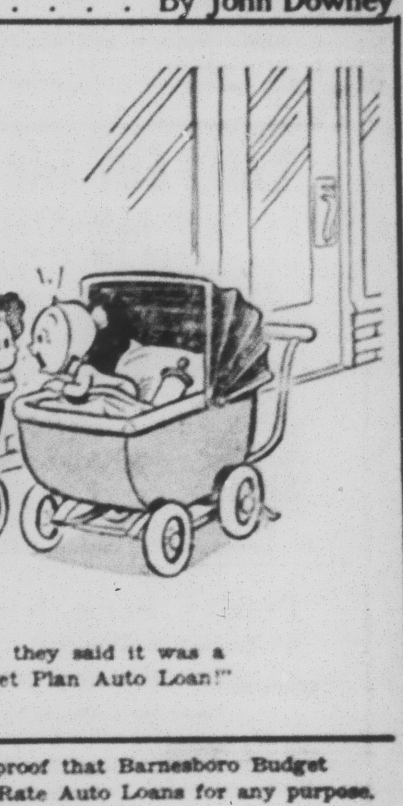
