Patton's Pat Marquette Has Good Record As Cage Coach

Panthers Win 56 In Past 4 Years; Drop 18

Pat Marquette, basketball coach at Patton High School, has achieved an outstanding athletic record not only during World War II, but also after it.

He has been well known to district sports fans since 1946 when he came to Patton as football and basketball coach. Last year, however, he resigned as head football coach and now devotes most of his time to basketball.

Patton basketball team won five games and lost one.

During the war Mr. Marquette was a first lieutenant assigned to the War Department in the Athletic Branch. He served 43 months in the army. During that time he planned and helped to organize in all parts of the world athletic programs for the army.

Before the war, the Patton man coached football, basketball and baseball at McClintock Township High School. There in two years he achieved a record that included 14 wins and no losses in football; 32 wins and two losses in basketball and nine wins and one loss in baseball.

Previous to that Mr. Marquette taught in a school in New York State and served as a city recreational director. He attended the Augustinian High School in Carthage, N. Y., his native town. There he took part in football and basketball. He was a member of the basketball team which for three years represented New York State in the National Catholic Invitational Tournament in Chicago.

Mr. Marquette received his bachelor of arts degree from Villanova College in Philadelphia. There he played tackle on the football team and center on the basketball squad. He won his letter each year in both sports.

Mr. Marquette also had the distinction of being a member of the Villanova team which played Auburn in Havana, Cuba in 1937.

The Patton coach also is well trained for the educational phase of his work. He received a master of education degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1949 and holds a principal's and school administrator's certificate. He also pursued advanced work at the University of Pittsburgh at present. He teaches health, physical education and problems of democracy at the high school.

Since he came to Patton he developed some of the best cage teams of the district. For three years his quintet was the section champion and it won the Northern Cambria League one year. The records show that his teams have won 56 games and lost 18 encounters. So far this season the
