

Veterans Insurance Dividend Said to Average About \$85

Payment to Be Made On '51 Anniversaries

Starting in April, the Veterans Administration will distribute a \$500 million life insurance dividend to some 8 million World War II veterans who hold National Service Life Insurance policies. The payments, according to the VA, will occur throughout the year on the policy anniversary dates.

The formula for paying the dividend as yet has not been completed. The amount of each dividend will vary according to the number of months the policy was in force, the plan of insurance, the face value of the policy, and the age of the holder at the time it became effective. Studies on rates are being made.

However, the average payment is expected to figure out to near \$85 compared with an average of \$175 for the first special dividend on which the VA started payments in January, 1951.

The initial dividend totaled \$2.8 billion, about four times the forthcoming payment. However, it applied to more than 16 million policies, twice as many as are included in this year's dividend.

Last Special Dividend

The one to pay this year probably will be last special dividend, according to the VA. However, where there is a surplus in the insurance fund, dividends will be paid annually—and automatically. The dividends represent the surplus over amounts needed to pay claims and maintain reserves.

The initial dividend covered the period from the start of the National Service Life Insurance program in Oct., 1940, through the 1948 anniversary dates. The second dividend will be for three years, from 1948 through the 1951 anniversary.

The second dividend applies to all so-called term policies and to those converted to permanent plans, including those which have lapsed or were terminated by the death of the policy-holder. However, policies must have been held

Schools May Close

102 are from West Carroll Twp., 48 from East Carroll Twp., one from Prince Gallatin School District and 60 from Carrolltown Borough. There are also 15 students from West Carroll who attend high school at Spangler. A total of 28 teachers would be affected by the shut-down. Eight-

teen of them are from West Carroll and 10 from Carrolltown. It is understood that the West Carroll teachers are willing to continue even if there is no money. The cost of tuition for the West Carroll pupils is based on the operating cost of the previous year of the high school. Based on last year's expenses, operating costs of Carrolltown High School were about \$14.87 a month per pupil. That is what West Carroll Board has to pay each month for each of the 102 students who at-

tend Carrolltown High School. It was announced that the West Carroll board is doing all in its power to meet its obligations with the Carrolltown board. Even in its deficit, the board is paying six percent interest.

Too Little Taxable Property

School taxes in West Carroll Twp. have been placed as high as possible. The trouble is that, in spite of the population of West Carroll Twp., there is not enough taxable property to bring in suf-

ficient income, school officials said. Most of the coal which is dumped in Bakerton is taken from land in Barry and East Carroll Twp., it was explained. These townships reap the benefit of the taxation.

The assessed valuation in West Carroll is higher than in any district in the county. That means the residents are paying a high tax rate. Property tax for school purposes has been set at \$5 mills in West Carroll Twp. This is the legal limit. In addition, school

directors have levied a \$5 per capita tax and an earned income tax of one-half of one percent. The earned income tax, however, is not bringing in much revenue, it was announced. Mr. Columbus said that officials of Barnes & Tindler Coal Co. and Reindeer Coal Co. have refused to collect the tax at the source. A tax on coal dumped might have derived some revenue for the township, but that was declared invalid by the courts some time ago.

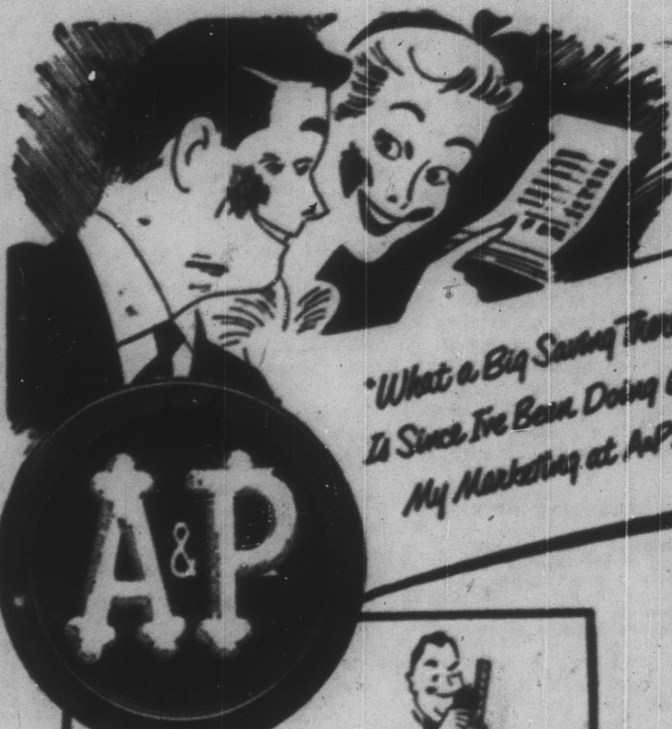
