

Easter Seal Drive in Cambria County To Open Sunday

Funds Will Aid Many Area Crippled Children

The 1951 Easter Seal campaign will be started, at the earliest date in its 18-year history, according to Cambria County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, which conducts the fund-raising effort in this area.

Samuel Powell, Easter Seal chairman for the Cambria County Society, said the campaign will open this Sunday, Feb. 25, and continue for one month or until Easter Sunday, Mar. 25.

Easter, which is the first Sunday after the first full moon after Mar. 21, is the earliest this year since 1913 when it fell on Mar. 23.

Preparations for the Easter Seal campaign, according to Mr. Powell, were begun even before the holidays so everything would be in readiness for the opening date.

Mr. Powell declared that the Cambria County Society desired to reach even more families than in previous years, and to enlist support from a still greater number of persons so that Easter Seal services to crippled children may not only be maintained at their present levels but expanded to care for the increasing number of youngsters needing assistance.

"It is our hope this year that the Easter Seal message may be carried to more than ever before," Mr. Powell said, "thus arousing support from a greater number of our local citizens.

"There are more crippled children every year and the services to help overcome their handicaps are more expensive every year, just as everything is more expensive. We hope to have larger funds to maintain present services and expand our facilities to the many more who need our help."

Postoffice to Cut Use Of Railroads To Transfer Mail

Trucks May Be Used For Short-Haul Trips

The Postoffice Department in Washington, D. C., plans to move much of its short-haul mail in the future by truck instead of by train.

John M. Redding, assistant postmaster general, called the shift "the most important change in basic postal transportation policy since airmail." He announced the change this week. It is being made to save money, he said.

Redding added that the diversion from rail to road for mail to be moved 200 miles or less will get under way in the next few weeks. He declined to say how much of it will go—under competitive bidding—into trucks, but indicated contract truckers will eventually get a substantial portion of it. Short-haul mail, Redding said, costs \$100 million a year.

The assistant postmaster general said surveys for highway routes already have been made out of Chicago, St. Louis and Boston. He said surveys will start soon out of Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Harrisburg, New York City, Cincinnati and Seattle.

Redding said a pending petition from railroads asking a 95 percent increase in mail pay rates, and an increasing number of rail branch line abandonments influenced the decision to change. Both economy and speed will result, he said.

The Association of American Railroads had no immediate comment on the forthcoming diversion.

According to Postoffice Department figures, it costs the government 80 cents a mile to move a 60-foot railway mail car 200 miles, and up to \$3.20 a mile for distances as short as 20 miles.

Redding said a truck holding about half as much as a railway mail car can be moved any distance at 25 to 30 cents a mile, not including docking terminal expenses. These are included in rail costs.

TB Society Lists Activities For 1950

4,250 Adults, Children X-Rayed During '50

Expenditures for the Johnstown Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis during 1950 were \$12,607, according to a recent announcement. Last year's receipts were \$14,586.

During the year the society distributed 18,000 social hygiene pamphlets, 14,500 pamphlets to Creason Sanatorium and organizations and to the public, 37,000 book marks, 37,000 packages of Christmas Seals, 1,000 window cards, 24 Christmas Seal trailers to the theatres in the county, 10 two-column newspaper cuts, 16 electric transcription to radio stations, 400 health charts and 2,000 health pamphlets.

Other activities included 652 office calls, mailed 10,000 follow-up cards in January, contacted 48 county chairmen, X-rayed 4,250 students and adults from Creason, Spangler, Barnesboro, Patton, Ebensburg, Lilly, Nanty-Glo, and other schools in Northern Cambria County; mailed 4,300 reports to those X-rayed and to 50 who were reexamined; arranged to test 400 grade school students in Scalp Level this spring; assisted the department and the Women's Clubs of Creason, Lilly and Galitzin with the mobile unit in X-raying 1,200 adults in December.

Ronald Whited Is Accepted By Army Technical School

Sgt. Robert J. Snyder, in charge of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station in Barnesboro announced the enlistment of the first North Cambria youth to be accepted for Technical Schooling under the U. S. Army Technical Schooling Program.

He is Ronald Whited, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Whited of Barnesboro. Ronald is a graduate of Barnesboro High School and was formerly employed by Yonkosi Service Station, Pvt. Whited will report to Fort Dix, N. J., for his basic training and will report to Aberdeen Proving Grounds in Maryland in May for entrance into the Electric and Acetylene Welding Course.

Enlisting in the U. S. Air Force was Jesse Jodon, 23, son of Mrs. Mary Jodon of Barnesboro. Jesse has enlisted for his third time, serving 1 1/2 years in the U. S. Army and 2 years in the Navy.

While in the Navy, Jesse was assigned to the USS Missouri (BB-63) and has made trips to Panama, Cuba, England and France. Pfc. Jodon has now enlisted for a period of four years and expects to make the U. S. Air Force his career. He reports to Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., for assignment.
