

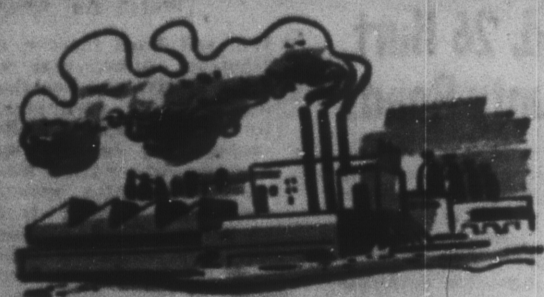

Area High School Students Eligible For SFC Scholarship

Applications Must Be In By April Deadline

Seven more St. Francis College scholarships will be made available to area high school students. Scholarships amounting to \$6,000.00 in value will be awarded seven successful participants in the college's second annual scholarship program.

At the present time, six area men and one area girl are attending the college under last year's scholarship awards. Similar awards have also been established for students residing in the area beyond commuting distance of Loretto. These scholarships will be awarded on a regional basis, with examinations being held in the principal cities of the United States. The St. Francis scholarship program, interrupted during World War II, was renewed last year.

President Adrian J. Veigle, TOR, said that all awards granted will be good for four years, subject only to the student's continued good conduct and scholastic standing.

Procedure for participating in the scholarship program was outlined by Ferdinand F. Bonax, the secretary of the Scholarship Committee. All students interested in participating must apply to the scholarship secretary. High school guidance instructors wishing to enter worthy students have been asked to contact the scholarship secretary and to submit the names of worthy students. All

students will be asked to file an application blank, together with the reasons why he or she feels that scholarship help is needed. All applications will be accompanied by letters of recommendation from persons who have the knowledge of the applicant's need and ability. John W. Fries, assistant professor of education at St. Francis, will prepare the scholarship examinations. All examination will be held at St. Francis College during the early part of May. Awards will be granted on the basis of the application, recommendation and the results of the scholarship examination.

Every high school student in the North Cambria area is eligible to enter the scholarship competition. The deadline for all applications has been set for April 10, 1951. A card or letter indicating an intention to enter competition should be addressed to "The Secretary, Scholarship Committee, St. Francis College, Loretto, Pa."

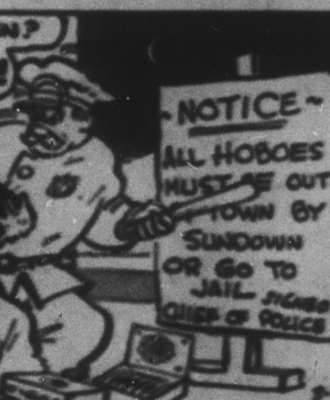
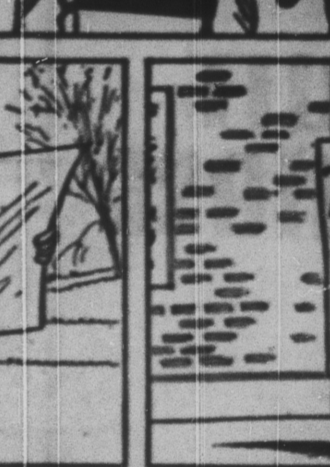
