Work On Miners' Hospital Wing Called Off Indefinitely

\$191,000 Still Needed To Complete Work

Work on the construction of the new wing at the Miners' Hospital in Spangler came to a halt Friday afternoon.

Announcement of cessation of work was made by State Sen. John J. Hahnke, who serves as administrator of the hospital, at a meeting of the board of directors of the institution Thursday evening.

Hahnke also leveled a blast at county officials and the businessmen in the Northern Cambria section.

He said he would pay the construction firm \$25,000 Friday and that he would tell officials of the firm that the work would be their final payment.

"Many businessmen and county officials have failed to pay any attention to my appeal for funds and, therefore, I must announce the cessation of work on the wing because of the lack of funds and of public interest," the senator said.

The wing, according to his statement, is now about 25 percent completed. It would add 77 beds to the hospital.

He explained that if the hospital could have raised \$350,000 the federal government would have paid \$200,000 or the amount of money needed to complete the project. However, he explained, the hospital has paid \$110,000 thus far in the construction. The payment Friday brought to total \$145,000. In addition, the building fund has a balance of \$17,000.

"In other words," said Hahnke, "we have a total of \$162,000 toward \$350,000. We still need \$188,000. There is no way we can raise this money either now or in the immediate future."

Magee Ave. Work Expected to Start Sometime in May

Ask Property Owners To Check Water Lines

Resurfacing of the business section of Magee Ave. in Patton probably will be done sometime during May according to word received by the Patton Borough Council.

Efforts have been made over the past several years to have a blacktop surface put on the main thoroughfare. The work will be done by the State Department of Highways.

Council this week advised property owners along Magee Ave. in the downtown section that there are many old water lines located along the route to be resurfaced. Many are causing disruptions in water service.

The officials advise these property owners, as well as those on Fifth Ave. from Palmer House corner to Beech Ave. to have taps checked and have them moved before work begins on this improvement. It is pointed out that a good deal of expense and work will be saved by having this work done before improvements are made.

Area Towns Hit By 19 Casualties In Korean Fighting

A total of 19 casualties from the Northern Cambria area were reported by the Department of Defense from July 20 to Feb. 28. This figure was included among 72 casualties from Cambria County.

The area casualty list broken down shows one killed, one died of wounds, three missing, 11 wounded and three injured.

Of the 10 Northern Cambria communities listed in the report, Carrolltown was the hardest hit with five casualties. This community had one soldier, one wounded, three wounded and one injured.

Ebensburg was second in line with one killed and three wounded.

Both Barnesboro and Hastings had two casualties. Barnesboro has two missing and Hastings, two wounded.

Area towns with one Korean casualty are Patton, one wounded; St. Benedict, one wounded; Spangler, one injured; Nicktown, one missing; Gollitsin, one injured; and Kennel, one wounded.

Carrolltown, which heads the list, in this area, has had two more Korean casualties since the Feb. 28 date—one wounded and one missing. Patton is also listed with another casualty—one wounded.
