## Retailers Required To File Pricing Charts On Items

The Office of Price Stabilization announced a few weeks ago that retail sales of 167 categories of hard and soft goods had been released from the across-the-board price freeze put into effect Jan. 26.

The new order—known as Ceiling Price Regulation 7—sets profit margins on these goods at the level of Feb. 24.

Categories affected by CPR-7 include all those commonly sold in men's and women's apparel and shoe stores, most of the items carried in furniture and floor covering stores and more than 75 percent of the volume handled by department stores.

Each retailer must file a pricing chart with his district OPS office by Mar. 20 showing his prices as of Feb. 24, what he paid for the goods and what his percentage markup was.

Two copies of the pricing chart must be prepared. The merchant keeps one copy and files the other with the OPS district office. The office serving the North Cambria area and all of Cambria County is in the Fulton Building, Sixth and Duquesne Streets, Pittsburgh.

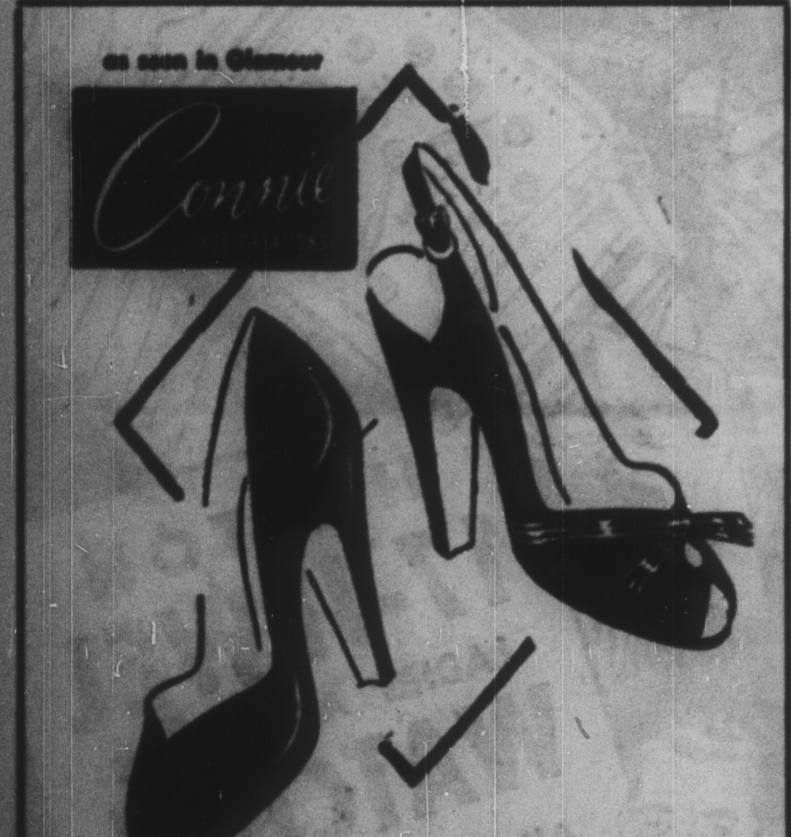
The regulation tells the retailer in detail how to prepare the chart. OPS, however, does not furnish the price chart. The retailer must furnish his own.

All records required by CPR-7 must be kept as long as the Laissez-Faire Production Act of 1946 remains in effect and for two years thereafter. Generally, except for certain chain stores, the records are to be kept in the retailer's place of business.

Beginning July 1, stores must post in prominent places the following sign:

"Notice—The prices of merchandise in this store are no higher than OPS ceiling prices of the articles."

tor, said that while some price increases were bound to result, he expected that the many price rollbacks resulting from the order would more than cancel out the roll-forwards.

OPS officials said the aim is to get margins back to pre-Korean levels. If a compliance check and the retailers' report show this

is not occurring on some items, specific rollbacks probably will be ordered.

Still under the Jan. 26 general freeze are retail sales of such items as fur garments, jewelry, large appliances, drugs and cosmetics, lumber, building supplies, hardware, fuel, gasoline and oil, and food and beverages.

Meat packers are effected by another recent OPS regulation. This also concerns operators of some frozen food lockers.

Every person who slaughtered any livestock last year will be placed on a quota basis. A report must be filed by this Thursday on the number of cattle, calves, sheep and lambs slaughtered

by the packers during each month in 1950.

After the report is filed, OPS will give the slaughterer his quota for the comparable month this year. This quota is to be issued by Apr. 1. Anyone not receiving a quota notice will not be permitted to do any slaughtering.
