PLANT TREES NOW... Trees Enhance Both Value, Beauty Of Any Property

Timber Crop Plantings Benefit Unused Land

With the many changes in farming technique, and economic conditions in the past two decades, it has become impractical to crop certain sections of farms. Much of this land has been producing nothing but a crop of weeds year after year until much of its fertility is gone.

Now poor land will grow satisfactory timber crops, but trees, like other crops in suitable climatic conditions, grow best on the better soils. Therefore you should not delay planting this idle land to a crop of trees.

Trees growing for timber crops are not such a long term investment. A satisfactory crop of sawlogs should be produced in 50 years. At 30 and 40 years a profitable crop of cord wood can be removed in thinning necessary to keep a plantation productive.

When the trees have reached sawing size an increasingly valuable harvest can be made at 10-year intervals forever, if proper

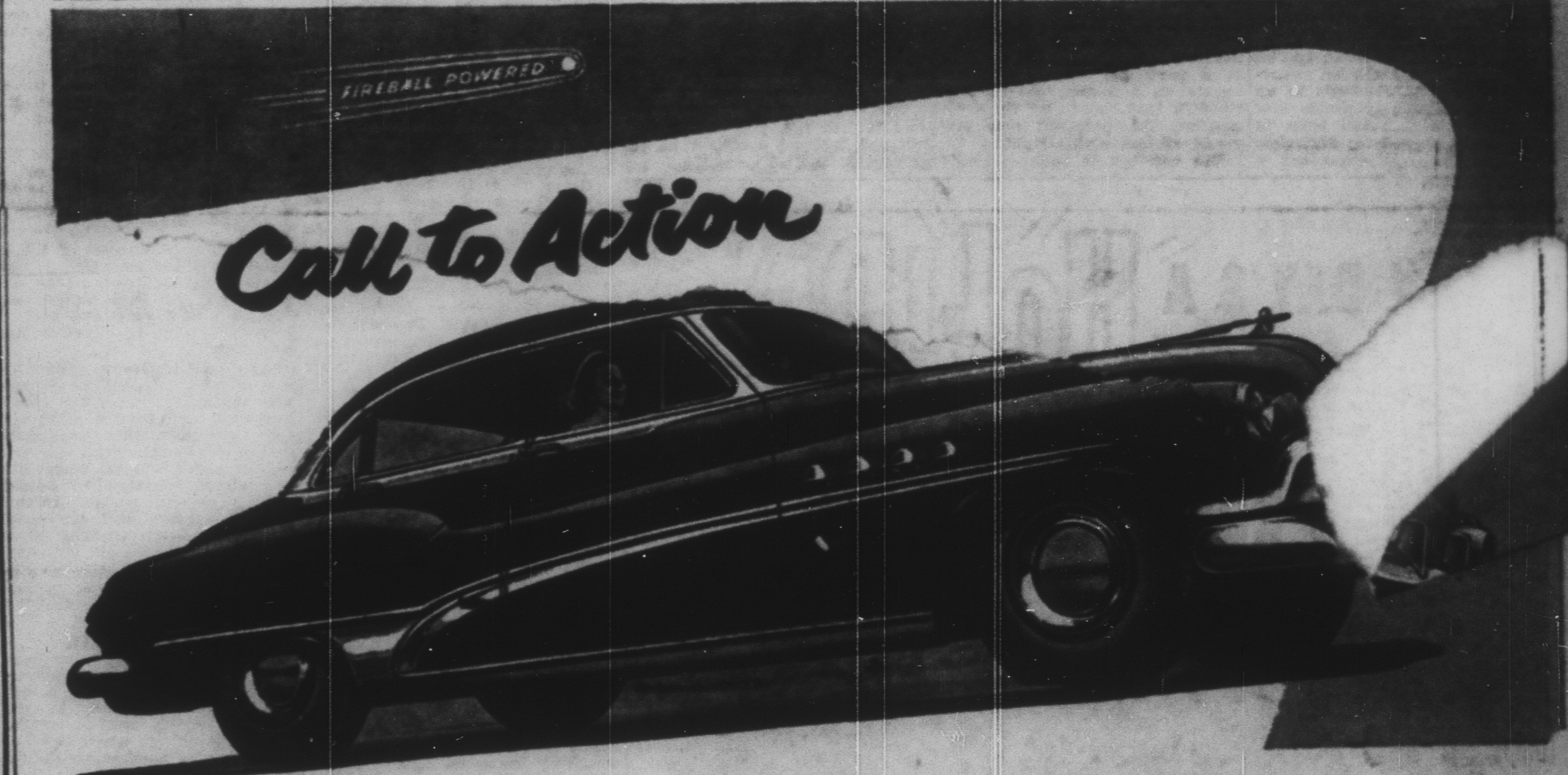
