## Hockey League To Add Teams For Next Season

The Eastern Hockey League last Wednesday increased its membership to six teams, with a possibility that at least two more may be admitted before the 1934-35 season starts. Meeting in the Atlantic City Convention Hall, the league admitted Philadelphia and Washington, D. C.

Baltimore and New Haven also applied for berths but final action was postponed until the league's annual meeting in Boston June 4-5. Two other inquiries and another application, from undisclosed cities were received but a league official said the league wanted a little more time to study them.

The league, of which the Johnstown Jets are defending champions, announced that next season it will revert to overtime play in case of tie games. One 10-minute period of sudden-death play will be used in an effort to break the deadlocks.

A big hockey season is in store for Cambria County fans this coming fall at the War Memorial in Johnstown. The Eastern Hockey League will open next October.

## Coal Research Inc. Names Heath Clark

Two men have been named to a new plan-of-action committee of the Bituminous Coal Research Inc.

They are Heath Clark of Indiana, chairman of the finance committee of Rochester & Pittsburgh Coal Company, and Andrew B. Crockett Jr. of Johnstown, vice president of Johnstown Coal & Coke Company.

A three-fold purpose has been outlined for the newly-formed group as follows:

- 1-To evaluate the research and engineering needs of the industry as soon as possible.
- 2-To recommend an effective program for such activities for accelerated industry progress.
- 3-To obtain early industry consideration of such a research program.

"The ultimate objection," said Dr. Potter, "is adequate balanced program of research, engineering and promotion of results that will bridge the gap between research reports and the practical application of technical advancements by coal and railroad companies and coal users."

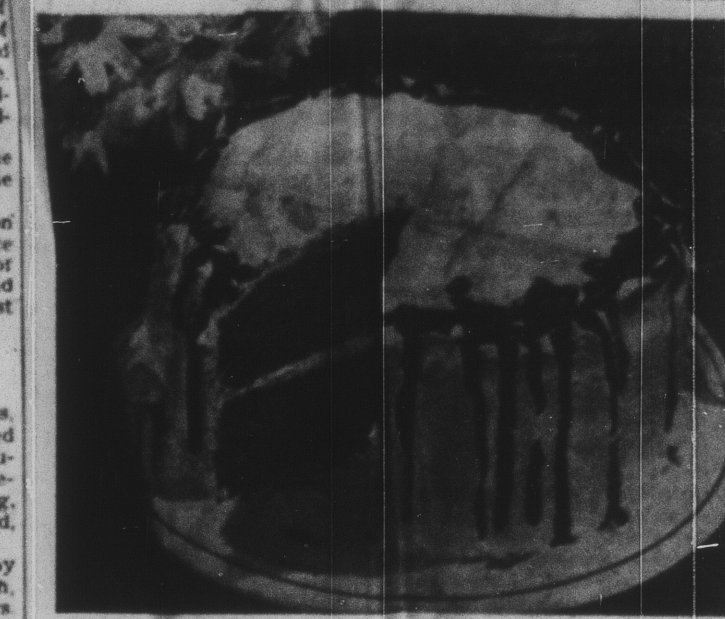
A talk about the possibilities of establishing a canning factory in this area was given by H. C. Williams, the Cambria County farm agent.

Father John Doyle to Observe Event May 30

Rev. Father I. J. Denny, pastor of the Cathedral of the Sacred Sacrament, Altoona, will deliver the sermon on the golden jubilee of the ordination of Very Rev. John P. M. Doyle, TOR, STM, pastor of St. Francis Seminary, Legett.

Father Denny, a prominent St. Francis grad, will speak during the pontifical jubilee mass May 30, in St. Michael's Catholic Church, Legett. Most Rev. Richard T. Guilfoyle, D. D., Bishop of Altoona Diocese, will be celebrant.

## BONNY TWEED CAKE

- 1 cup sifted Pillsbury's best enriched flour
  - 1 teaspoon soda
  - 1/2 cup shortening
  - 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
  - 2 eggs
  - 1/2 squares (101) semi-sweet chocolate, coarsely grated
  - 2 tablespoons grated orange rind
  - 1 cup buttermilk or sour milk
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Sift together flour, soda and salt; cream shortening, add brown sugar gradually, creaming well. Blend in eggs one at a time beat 1 minute. Add grated chocolate, orange rind, walnuts. Add buttermilk and vanilla alternately with dry ingredients to creamed mixture, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Blend well after each addition. (With electric mixer use low speed.) Pour batter into well-greased and lightly-floured 9-inch round layer pans. Bake in moderate oven (350) 25 to 30 minutes. Cool and frost with Fluffy Orange Frosting.
