Holmes Council Awards Safety-Record Citations

National honors have been given to two North Cambria mining men.

They have been awarded citations for distinguished safety achievements by the Joseph A. Holmes Safety Association with headquarters in Washington, D. C.

John O. Gill of Barnesboro and Steven Jancura of Hastings were the two area men given awards.

Mr. Gill was honored for "working in and around the Barnes & Tucker Company coal mines for 50 years without suffering a disabling accident. Mr. Jancura, who has served as burghess of Hastings for the past 35 years, was lauded "for working in coal mines for 47 years without having a lost-time accident." He is employed by Rich Hill Coal Mining Company.

Following screening, the winners were selected from recommendations received during the year from operating companies, associations and individuals.

The Holmes organization was formed in 1916 to commemorate and further the work of the late Dr. Joseph Austin Holmes, first director of the U. S. Bureau of Mines. Dr. James Boyd, who is head of the agency now, is president of the national safety organization.

The Northern Cambria Holmes Council was represented at the annual meeting in Washington earlier this month.

Tokarchik Handed Added Jail Term

Will Serve Sentence In Western Penitentiary

The case of George Tokarchik, the Cambria County Jail prisoner who attacked an Ebensburg woman, was brought to a close on Monday when an additional sentence was imposed by the court.

Judge George W. Griffith sentenced the 29-year-old Johnstown man to serve 2 1/2 to 5 years in the Western Penitentiary for assault and battery with intent to ravish.

It was the second sentence imposed by the judge as a result of an Dec. 5 attack. At the conclusion of the trial in March, Tokarchik was sentenced to serve 1 1/2 to 3 years for aggravated assault and battery.

Since conviction on both charges resulted from the same incident, the judge said, the sentences must run concurrently. Sentence on the "intent to ravish" charge was delayed until Monday because a motion for a new trial had been made. The motion was denied in an opinion handed down by Judge Griffith last week.

With the new sentence, Tokarchik has at least six years to serve in jail. He currently is serving out the remainder of a previous sentence which has 3 1/2 years to go. The 2 1/2-to-5 and the 1 1/2-to-3-year sentences will not begin until the end of 1954. Both of the latter sentences are the maximum under the law but both must be served at the same time.

Tokarchik was serving the original sentence when he climaxed a day of freedom from the Cambria County Jail by attacking the Ebensburg woman.

Anyone not contacted who desires to donate is asked to phone him and a solicitor will stop.

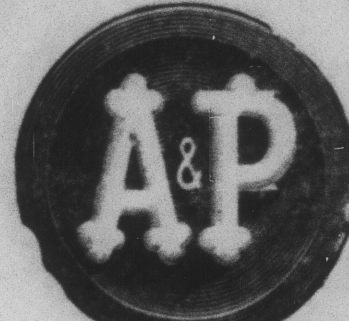

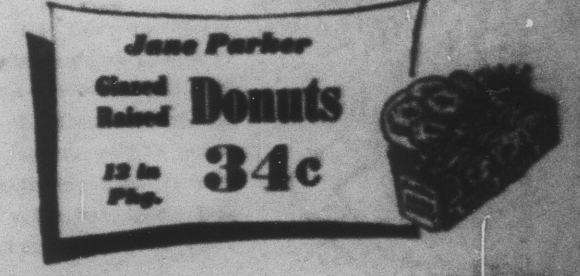

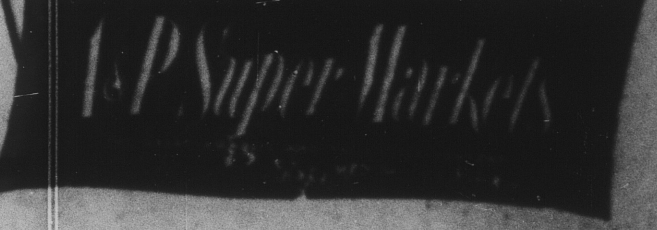
