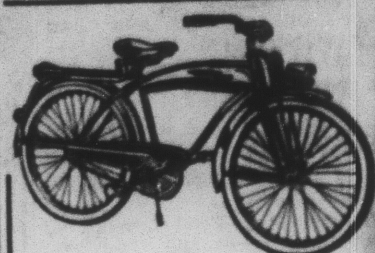

Choice Assignment Now Open in Army Details Available At Barnesboro Station

Sgt. Robert J. Snyder of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Service announced today that the Regular Army volunteer is still afforded many opportunities for choice of assignment.

In explanation, the Sergeant commented on the current technical school plan which offers assignment to one of 23 technical schools to the high school graduate volunteer. He listed the Airborne with its extra pay and extra physical training; the Army Language School; the U. S. Disciplinary Barracks in Pennsylvania; the Officer Candidate Courses and many other career opportunities for area enlistees.

Each of these assignments requires the usual mental and physical qualifications and in addition some assignments now are available to previous servicemen only. Sgt. Snyder is located in the Luzerne Building in Barnesboro, where he can be contacted for complete information concerning the Regular Army.
