Catholic Diocese Of Greensburg To Include All Of Indiana County

Pope Pius XII Wednesday of this week established a new Catholic Diocese in Greensburg, Pa., and appointed the Most Rev. Hugh L. Lamb, auxiliary to Dennis Cardinal Dougherty, Archbishop of Philadelphia, as its first Bishop.

Formation of the new diocese was announced by the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, the Apostolic Delegate to the United States.

He said it will consist of the counties of Armstrong, Indiana, Westmoreland and Fayette in Western Pennsylvania. Formerly a part of the Pittsburgh Diocese, the new church subdivision has about 165,000 Catholics.

Bishop Lamb, whose cathedral will be the beautiful Blessed Sacrament Church in Greensburg, was born in Modena, Pa., in 1891. He was schooled at the St. Charles Seminary in Philadelphia and the North American and Propaganda of the Faith Colleges in Rome, Italy. He was ordained in Rome in 1915 and then did post-graduate study at the Catholic University in Washington, D. C.

He was consecrated Auxiliary Bishop of the Philadelphia Archdiocese in 1936, after prior service as a parish priest, prison chaplain, seminary professor, secretary to Cardinal Dougherty, school superintendent and chancellor of the Philadelphia Archdiocese.

His Holiness Pope Pius also appointed Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, the very noted radio orator and writer, as titular Bishop of Caserta and auxiliary to Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

Announcement that Bishop Spellman's fifth auxiliary was made by the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States.
