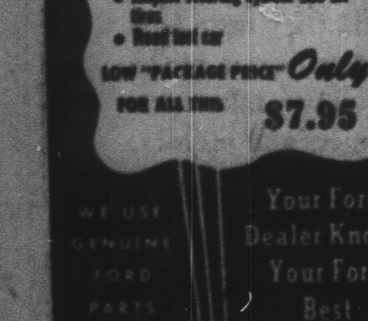
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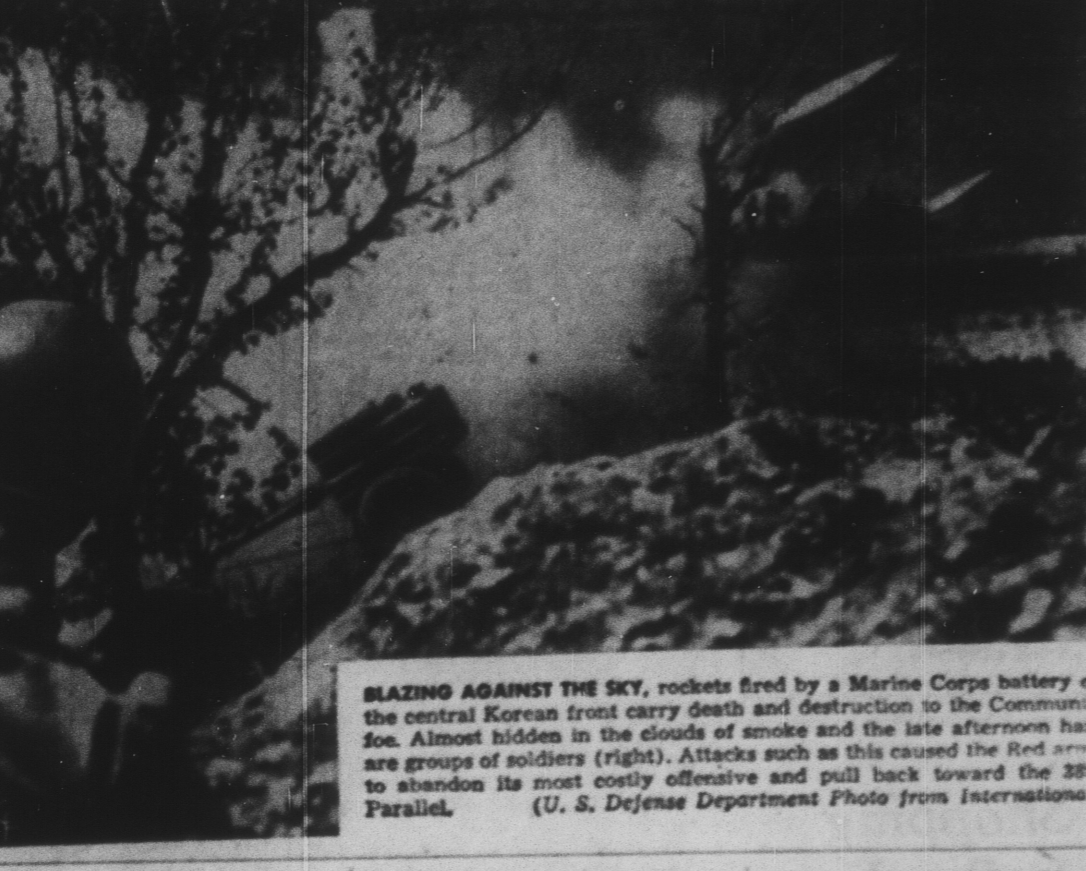
will be indoors in a room of her home set up for the purpose. All parents are urged to send their children for educational and recreational purposes.

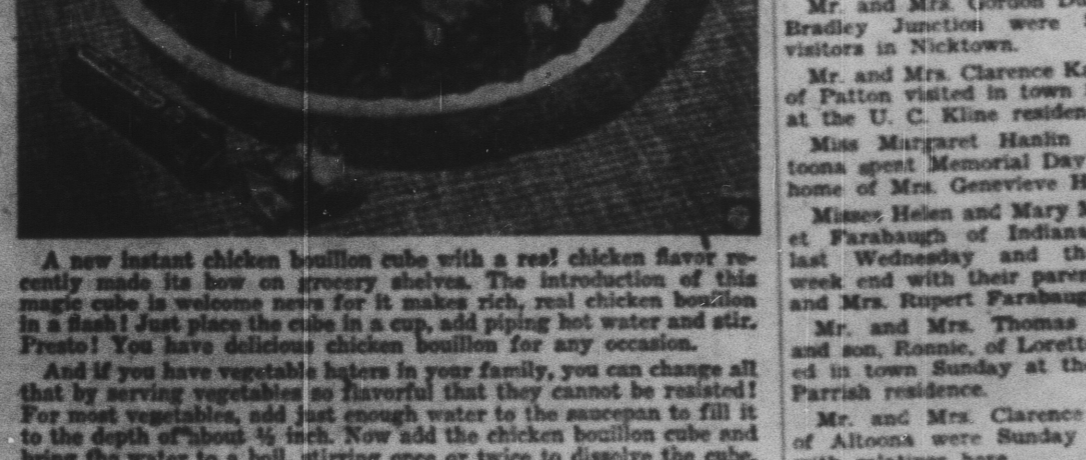
