## 6 Boys' Teams Swing Into Action As Play Starts Friday

"Don't ask me how I'd make out against Edward Charles if I met him again," Louis said. "First I got to take this Les Savold. That's the big worry today."

Savold, who looks more like a hunky rancher than the British Board of Boxing Control's version of the world heavyweight champion, is two years younger than 35-year-old Louis. He craves a lot of confidence and good fellowship.

## Wallard Burned Badly In Holiday Big Car Classic

Lee Wallard, winner of the Indianapolis Memorial Day auto race, was burned seriously last Sunday on his return to dirt track driving at the Reading Fairgrounds.

Wallard's car caught fire as he came into the home stretch on the 30th and final lap around the half-mile oval. The Atamont, N. Y. driver stood up as the race passed the packed grandstand. With several cars still running, Wallard elected to steer his blazing machine to the outside of the track.

Fifty yards past the grandstand he leaped out of the car, his trousers and shirt blazing. Spectators rushed to his assistance and smothered the flames. The 40-year-old race pilot, who had been feted before the race for his victory at Indianapolis, was taken to the Reading Hospital. The hospital reported he had very deep burns of the arms and legs and listed his condition as serious.

Bill Schindler, Freeport, N. Y., won the 15-mile race in 13:31.89. Johnny Parsons, Van Nuys, Calif., was second; Tommy Hinnovoritz of Reading, third and Wallard, fourth.

## Farmers Can Get Pay for Missing Nests In Mowing

The mower is one of the leading causes of pheasant mortality in the Commonwealth. Farmers usually cut their alfalfa, timothy and clover crops about the time broody pheasants have incubated their eggs, or while the tiny chicks are being mothered in the nest. At such times the female is slow to flush, and the cutting bar ends her life. Following her death, the dependent chicks perish, or the clutch of eggs is lost. Even when the hen is not on the nest at the time the hay that conceals it is cut, the exposed eggs or chicks become viable to winged predators and are soon destroyed.

In an effort to reduce mowing mortality, the State Game Commission sponsors a project by which farmers are paid \$1.00 apiece for each nest of cover left around nests containing the pheasant or quail eggs or chicks during the first mowing of alfalfa clover or timothy hay.

When an owner or lessee wishes payment of such unharvested cover, he must notify his District Game Protector. When inspection of such an area has been made, the game officer will certify that the \$1.00 per island payment shall be made to the owner or lessee of the land on which the protective cover is left.

A humane conservation practice long employed by many farmers or their children, has been to locate and mark nests prior to mowing time, so that the machine operator would know the areas to be skipped.

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## Sportsmen Urge State Doe Season to Follow Buck Time

Say Shooting Scares Males Into Deep Woods

The Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs has asked the State Game Commission to set a special doe season to follow the regular buck shooting instead of preceding it as it did last year.

The club's board of directors met at Fisherman's Paradise near Bellefonte. Members presented their resolutions at the last Friday meeting of the commission which heard ideas on 1951 hunting dates and limits.

Last year hunters protested the commission's two-day antlerless deer season, contending the concentrated gunfire would drive the bucks into the hills.

"If a doe season is needed this year to control the deer herd, it should be set for two days at the end of the buck season," the resolution stated.

Other recommendations by the sportsmen's club included:

- Quail and grouse—Extension of the season from 12 to 15 days, beginning Nov. 1.
- Groundhogs—Season to begin June 1, 1952 instead of July 1 as it does this year.
- Ducks—Split season of 40 days.
- Snowshoe rabbits—Season from Christmas to New Year's Day.
- Squirrels and rabbits—Four a day and 20 a season.
- Raccoons—Five a day and 40 a season between Oct. 16, 1951, and Feb. 1, 1952.
- Beats—One-week season as last year with a week between the end of bear season and the opening of deer season.

The commission usually is guided by the recommendations of the federation. However, it heard all recommendations at last Friday meeting.

## Bunched Hitting Nets Ebersburg Win Over Colver

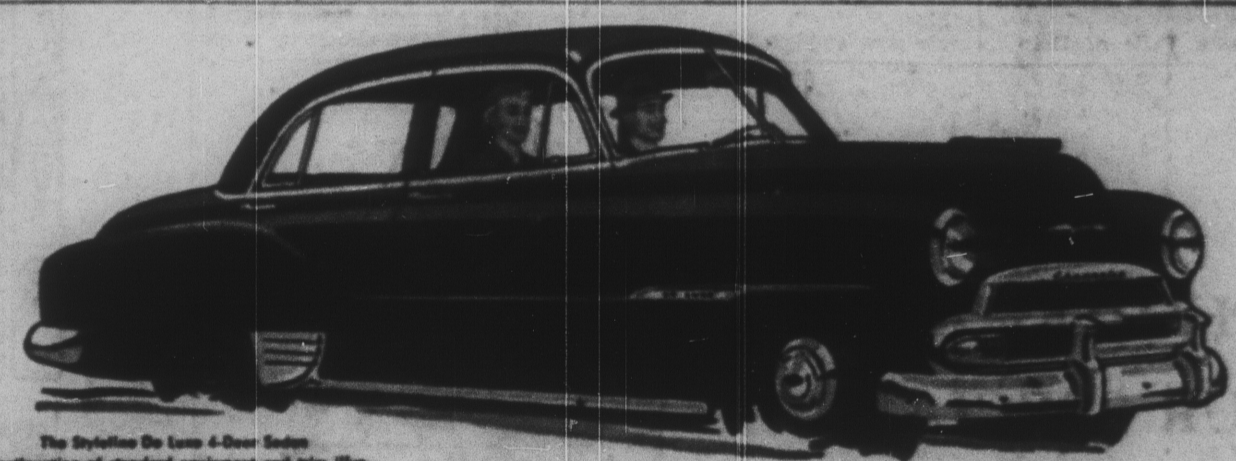
