Learn to Swim—2



1. Your body with the lungs filled with air is light enough to be suspended in water. Fill the lungs with air and slide the hands down the legs to the ankles. Before you reach your ankles the feet will come off the bottom and you will be floating like a jelly-fish.

2. The "jelly-fish" position is not a good one in which to swim. To learn how to float in a swimming position, do another jelly-fish float, only this time extend your legs backward and your arms forward and lie stretched out on the surface.

How to Float



3. Now forget the "jelly-fish" and concentrate on the present. Crouch low, submerge the face, and push off from the bottom with the feet. With only a little practice you will be able to glide along the surface for some distance.

4. To get more distance on your glide thrust the legs slowly and flexibly up and down after you have pushed off. This is the beginner version of the flutter-kick which later on will be a good and useful part of the "crawl."

Long-Distance Phone Dialing To Be Used In Area Soon

To Enable Direct Calls To Most Major Cities

A new telephone "operator toll dialing" system, by which long distance telephone operators may dial calls directly to telephones hundreds of miles away, will be placed in operation early in July by the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, it was announced today.

The project, which has cost the company more than \$8,000,000 enables operators to reach distant telephones without "passing" calls to other operators along the route.

Subscribers will continue to place their calls in the usual manner.

Telephone officials said the new system would result in speedier and more efficient connections.

Under the present system, a long distance operator, on receiving a call for a telephone number in another city, will "pass" the call to another operator in the distant city and she will make the actual connection to the called telephone. In some instances, calls are "switched" by a third operator in an intermediate city.

Under the new dial system, the long distance operator here gives the number to a Pittsburgh long distance operator who dials the call direct. She may dial to telephones in more than 1,000 cities in the United States—some as far away as the west coast.

In most cases, this is accomplished by the operator first dialing a special three-digit code for the desired city. The newly installed dial switching apparatus, which is located in the Bell Company's headquarters building at 418 7th Ave., Pittsburgh, automatically finds a circuit to the desired location and makes the connection.

The operator, without passing, dials the seven digits of the called telephone—the central office name abbreviation and the number—and the equipment in the distant city automatically completes the connection. Only a few seconds are required to complete a call by this method.

Instead of the conventional dial, the switchboards have been equipped with keys, not unlike those on an adding machine. The operators are able to "punch" the numbers on these keys faster than they can actually dial, which means a saving of seconds on each call.

Bell officials said the new dial equipment in Pittsburgh represents an investment of more than \$8,000,000. An additional \$2,000,000 has been spent for necessary new equipment in other Western Pennsylvania central offices.

The number of cities which can be dialed direct will increase constantly as additional facilities are installed throughout the country.

The new equipment may also be used, it was explained, to enable subscribers to dial their own long distance calls. It was explained. Such a project, on a limited basis, will be tried experimentally.
