State Doctors Plan To Cooperate In Cancer Detection

Determined to reduce the number of deaths from cancer in this state, the Medical Society of the State of Pennsylvania has asked its members to join in a plan to emphasize every doctor's office as a cancer detection center.

"Every physician in Pennsylvania is being asked to make available a 'five-point' cancer-detection examination to each of his patients at their request at least once a year," declared Dr. H. B. Gardner of Pittsburgh, president of the society.

"Doctors who are willing and able to cooperate will display a plaque in their reception rooms, so that patients will know that they can request this service at a fee to be established by the individual physician."

The program developed from the fact that a large percentage of cancers are found in one of five parts of the body, and if physicians were given the opportunity to perform physician examinations on all patients the diagnosis of the most accessible cancers would be made at an earlier date, when cure is more likely.
