Paul Lapinsky Returns From Duty in Far East

Paul Lapinsky, aviation ordnanceman third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lapinsky of 1516 20th Row, Colver, recently returned to the United States from the Far East aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Philippine Sea. Since he went to the Far East last August on the Philippine Sea, the ship has steamed more than 121,000 nautical miles. Her air groups have flown more than 10 combat sorties and are credited with the first MIG-15 shot down by naval pilots. While operating against the enemy a record total of 7,872 tons of high explosives was dropped in one operating period in support of the United Nations ground forces.

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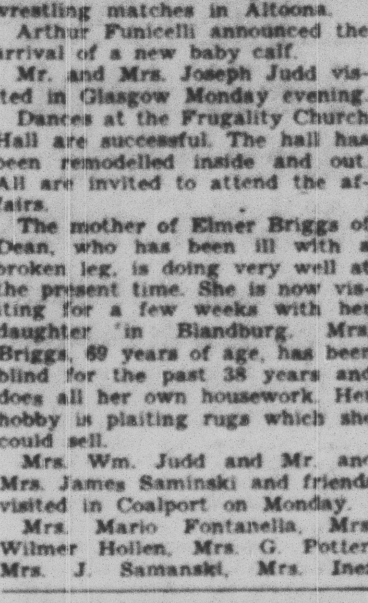
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New A.M.A. Head

Many thousands of dollars, many hundreds of man hours are spent by the Pennsylvania Department of Highways annually for repair and replacement of mutilated roadside signs. Secretary of Highways Ray F. Smock said today.

And if you think motorists are responsible for damage to the signs you are sadly mistaken—or so say the highway maintenance force.

No. 1 offender is the chap with a gun who finds the signs make targets that are irresistible.

No. 2 and 3, 4 and 5 are offenders with time on their hands who cover them with crayon, disassemble or bend them or tear them out by the roots, just for fun.

Malicious mischief it might be called although that is a charitable description of the wanton

destruction wrought by those who endanger the lives of motorists. Monkey with highway signs has tragic consequences. Motorists have been killed at intersections where stop signs have been removed, on turns where the curve sign has been reversed, and in other accidents that need not have happened.

And where the consequences of sign tampering are less tragic there remains the waste of the motor fund dollar.

"Money that must be spent for repair and replacement of signs isn't available for highway improvements," Smock added. "It is just thrown away."

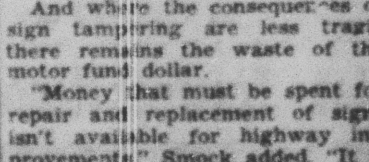

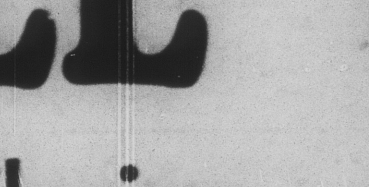
