return after completing his present assignment.



Since he went to the Far East last August on the Philippine Sea, the ship has steamed more than 121,500 nautical miles. Her air groups have flown more than 10 combat norties and are credited with the first MIG-15s shot down by navai pilots. While operating against the enemy a record total of 7,872 tons of high explosives was dropped in one operating period in support of the United Nations ground forces.
