Prison Board Told Cambria County Jail Among Best

Verbal Report Made By Prison Inspector

Members of Cambria County Prison Board were told on Monday that the county jail at Ebensburg is one of the best in the state.

The message was relayed to the board members by Judge George W. Griffith who said he had received a verbal report from a state prison inspector who recently visited the jail. The inspector was identified as Mr. Wagonsell.

The judge, who also is a board member, made his report at a monthly meeting of the board in Ebensburg on Monday. He said Mr. Wagonsell complimented Warden John McHugh as having one of the best-appearing and best-operated jails in the commonwealth.

Only two recommendations were made, Judge Griffith said. It was suggested that an assistant or part-time matron be hired to assist the present matron and that a more regular schedule for airing mattresses be set up.

Mrs. McHugh, wife of the warden, is the present matron. Warden McHugh was authorized to make inquiry and to recommend a woman who can be employed as an assistant to the matron on a part-time basis.

It was explained that the part-time matron would not work full hours but would be on call for emergency duty if needed during the matron's vacation period or at other times when she might be absent from the jail. The new job would carry only a nominal pay rate, it was decided.

2 Families Made Homeless By Bad Fire At Carrolltown

Blaze In Bender Building Breaks Out Again Saturday; Whole Block Threatened For Time

Carrolltown Fire Co. again was called at 5:30 Saturday morning to quell another outbreak of the fire which caused an estimated \$10,000 in damage to the Bender Clover Farm Store building and apartment house last Thursday evening in Carrolltown. The fire also threatened a number of other houses for several hours.

Saturday morning's blaze occurred in the top part of the brick-front section of the building, and probably was caused by a fire in a room where a number of men were sleeping. It burned quite briskly before being extinguished by two hose lines.

Quick-thinking on the part of 11-year-old Tommy Myers prevented a possible loss of life. Tom Myers, who was asleep at the time, and she rushed her family to safety.

The origin of the fire is undetermined. It was first seen by Tommy Myers as it looked up outside the window which looks into an upstairs porch at the rear of the building. An intensive investigation is being made into its cause by Carrolltown Fire Chief Tom Buck, police and insurance officials.

When flames arrived, power lines into the building were burning and they were hampered in their efforts for about 10 minutes while the lines were being cut.

Two families were made homeless during the fire, and both lost their belongings.

Father George Brugger Honored At Latrobe

Rev. Father George Brugger, O.S.B., pastor of St. Boniface, Catholic Church, St. Boniface, for the past 106 years, yesterday marked the golden anniversary of his profession as a Benedictine monk.

July 11, the feast day in honor of St. Benedict, is the traditional day at St. Vincent Archabbey for new members of the order to make solemn vows.
